At the first meeting the committee decided that each teacher prepare for a discussion on any subject pertaining to school work, only that the committee choose to select for the following meeting. EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Sixth P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the Fifth Week Ending Dec. 5, 1923

The Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest made a very gratifying gain during the 5th week, an increase of 98 eggs over the previous week's production. The total weekly production being 273 compared with 175 for last week. 622 eggs have been laid to date.

Mr. Sam McPherson's pen of White Leghorns led the Contest for the week with 43 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 13 second with 33 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns third with 30 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns fourth with 28 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12, fifth with 27 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 14 sixth with 24 eggs. Mr. Edward Bulphitt's pen of White Leghorns tied for seventh with the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 with 23 eggs each.

Mr. Sam McPherson's pen of White Leghorns leads the Contest to date with 95 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 13 second with 85 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 third with 74 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns fourth with 69 eggs. The Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 14 fifth with 66 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns sixth with 59 eggs, and the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 seventh with 54 eggs.

IN MEMORIAM

KATHERINE McCARTHY.

The whole community of Sturgeon and St. Mary's Road were shocked when on the evening of Nov. 20, 1923, the angel of death had entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. John McCarthy, and took for its victim their beloved daughter, Katherine.

Deceased, who was in her seventeenth year, had been ailing for only a few months, but nothing serious was thought about her until a few weeks previous to her death when she suddenly took a change for the worse; and notwithstanding all that medical aid and kind and loving nursing could do she sank rapidly until the end came on the above mentioned date.

Deceased was a bright, lovable girl, of a kindly disposition and although one might say on the very threshold of life, had made many friends for herself not only in the community where she lived, but with all those whom she came in contact during the brief space of her short sojourn. During her illness she was visited frequently by her beloved pastor, Rev. Theo. Gallant, who administered to her the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church, of which she was ever a devout and faithful member. She leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing father and mother, eight sisters and four brothers: Mrs. A. J. Phoenix Trainor, Archibald McKearney, and Agnes, of Atholboro, Mass.; Josephine, of Cambridge, Mass.; Annie, of Charlottetown; Helen Eliza and Lena at home. The brothers are: David, James, Martin and Daniel, all at home.

The funeral which took place on Nov. 22 was the largest seen in that vicinity for some time, wended its way slowly and solemnly to St. Paul's church, Sturgeon, where a requiem high mass was celebrated by the pastor, Rev. Theo. Gallant, who also conducted services at the grave, where all that was mortal of a kind and loving daughter and sister was laid to rest beside that of her sister Martha, who predeceased her three years ago. The pall-bearers were six of her school mates. May her soul rest in peace.

MR. DUGALD McLEAN.

Lean, which took place at the hospital at Windsor, Nova Scotia, on Thursday, the 29th of November, at the age of 79 years. Mr. McLean was born at Canoe Cove in the year 1844, the son of the late Neil McLean and Catherine Stewart. In the year 1878 he married Catherine McKenzie, who predeceased him some sixteen years ago. In 1882 he removed to Coleman, where he purchased a farm, but owing to failing health he disposed of it in 1904 and removed to Charlottetown, and from there to Amherst, N.S. Being of a cheerful and jovial disposition he soon made many friends. He was ordained as an elder of the Church of Scotland at Coleman by the late Rev. Mr. Goodwill, some thirty years ago. He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving father, one son and four daughters, viz: Harry, who holds a responsible position in Kenville Sanatorium and who accompanied the remains to their last resting place; Jeanette and Catherine, of Boston, who also arrived on the Island Saturday night; Margaret, of Calgary, and Sarah of Colorado; also three sisters: Mrs. William Kathrens, of Alberta; Mrs. Williams of Colorado; and Sarah in Massachusetts. His funeral which was largely attended was held in Canoe Cove on Sabbath, the 2nd December. The pious services were delivered in the church and at the grave by the Rev. Mr. Morris. The pall-bearers were, Donald McKinnon, Dugald McDougall, John J. McLean, Neil Campbell, Henry Taylor and Mark Inman.

MR. JOHN MACLEOD.

On November 12, 1923, John MacLeod, of Murray River, P. E. Island, passed away from the scenes of earth to the full joys of eternity. He was the son of the late Norman MacLeod, and was 79 years of age. For some time he had been laid aside through infirmity, during which period he endured his affliction with patience, awaiting the pleasure of his Heavenly Father, and enjoying the kind ministrations of his family.

Mr. MacLeod was an elder of the Church of Scotland, being ordained to that office some years ago. He rendered valuable assistance in the services of the church until bodily weakness compelled him to remain at home.

He had married Mary MacKenzie, who was his an industrious and capable companion. She predeceased him.

The family consist of Fred MacLeod, of Murray River, P. E. Island, Mrs. George MacKay, of Trenton, N.S., Mrs. James Frazer, of New Glasgow, Mrs. William MacKay, of Gladstone, P. E. I., Mrs. Alex. MacLeod, of Hiline, Montana, Mrs. Sewell Buchanan, of Murray River, and Miss Margaret MacLeod, of Boston, Mass. One sister, Mrs. Elizabeth White, of Beach Point, also survives him.

The funeral was held on Saturday, Nov. 17. The services were conducted by Rev. Ewen MacDougall, in the Kirk at Murray River. A large number of friends and relatives assembled in respect to the memory of the departed, in sympathy for the bereaved and to receive the comfort of the holy Christian religion, in the message that tells of Him who is alive forevermore and who has conquered death.

T. SHERMAN PETERS

The funeral of T. Sherman Peters whose death occurred on Friday, took place on Sunday afternoon, from his late residence, "Glenora" to St. John's Church, Gazetteown, N. B. The pastor, Rev. James Bennett, conducting the services at the house and church. The funeral was one of the largest seen here for some time, people coming from Fredericton and St. John, as well as from various places in the county.

Interment was made in the family plot in St. John's church yard. There was a very large number of beautiful floral pieces and cut flowers from relatives and friends.

All the members of the family were present except Mrs. Barnett and Mrs. Mary G. Peters, for whom special sympathy is expressed on account of their great distance from home. Mrs. Peters was Miss Mary B. Armstrong, of St. John, died in August, 1918. One daughter, Laura, died in early childhood.

Mr. Peters, came to Gazetteown as a young man, the greater part of his life being spent in Gazetteown, where part of the property he held belonged to the original grant to the Peters family, when they came to this province. He had always taken a prominent part in the affairs of the community, and had held various offices. In politics, he was a staunch adherent of the Conservative party, and he was a life long member of the Church of England, being warden in St. John's church for many years.
