GREAT HYDRAULIC ENGINEERING FEAT

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Nov. 9.—One of the most remarkable schemes in history of hydraulic engineering was tested here today, and proved a practical success.

The tower as it stood was about seventy feet high, and seven feet square. The lower twenty feet were of timber and the rest of solid concrete in six sections.

When the air cleared the dam was seen lying in the river in the position it was designed to occupy, but only part of it submerged. The section next to the top struck a boulder and broke in two, but as large chains were run through the whole length of the structure, bedded in concrete, neither of the broken sections can get out of place.

SALUTES FOR KING EDWARD

Most Formidable Anglo-American Naval Force Ever Assembled

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Thousands watched on the banks of the Hudson River at noon today, while six British warships in unison with double that number of American men of war fired a national salute of 21 guns in honor of King Edward's birthday.

The bands on the Drake and the Maine struck the British anthem, and quickly it was taken up by the bands on the Alabama and on the armored cruiser West Virginia.

Without diminishing the speed, the six cruisers swung around into the Hudson river. Threading their way through a network of incoming and outgoing liners, tugs, ferries and ships, large and small, the passage up the river was hailed with a pandemonium of noise.

RUMORS AFLOAT OF A MASSACRE

Of Jews Throughout Russia Next Sunday—Premier Witte Denies Complicity

WARSAW, Nov. 10.—(Special)—Alarming rumors are afloat that Sunday next has been fixed for a general massacre of Jews throughout Russia.

The Government denies absolutely any complicity by its agents in fomenting the recent disorders and Premier Witte announces that a searching investigation will be held and that all officers found guilty will be severely punished.
