PARIS CLOCK TO TALK MORE

So successful has been the talking clock in the Paris Observatory that its usefulness will be extended. An automatic time inquiry telephone exchange is to be opened and those asking the time will be switched directly to the timepiece itself. The clock is operated electrically and the talking part operates by means of a sound-tracking film just like that used in the movies of today. The film contains a speech record for every five seconds and counts out the remaining seconds with "peeps" like those heard when the radio time signal is broadcast. Thus, if you ask the clock the time when it is 18 seconds after a quarter past 10, it will reply: "Ten fifteen, fifteen peep, peep, peep."

Prospects Good For N. S. Fruit

HALIFAX, N. S., July 23—(By the Canadian Press)—Fruit, continues to grow well in spite of the dry weather conditions, according to a report of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture. Most crops were beginning to show a need of moisture, but recent showers have helped.

"Except for some 'yellow leaf, which is due in most cases to scab and spray injury, the foliage is excellent and with satisfactory growing conditions during the balance of the season the fruit should size well and the quality should be good."

"In well sprayed orchards the insects and diseases are well under control. Present indications are that the July drop will not be heavy."

"Prospects are for a crop of from 70 to 80 per cent of last year. Cherries promise to be a good crop in many places, but plums will be very light and pears much lighter than last year. Due to the extremely dry weather, strawberries will be a light crop in most sections of the province. The 'gray-banded leaf-roller' is quite numerous in some districts. Growers who are following the sod-mulch system should apply the under-leaf spray immediately. There is some 'fall-worm' showing in places. This should be controlled by a late-arsenical spray or by cutting off and burning all infested twigs. This insect attacks many forest and shade trees and may occur in any part of the province. Grasshoppers are reported to be numerous on the dyked lands in parts of Kings and Hants counties."

From the Annapolis Valley comes a report that the apple crop will be of exceptionally high quality. Coupling this with a report that the English crop will be light, the fruit-growers are optimistic. And there is a 10 per cent British duty against foreign apples, in favor of Empire-grown fruit.

Prospects Good For N. S. Fruit

HALIFAX, N. S., July 23—(By the Canadian Press)—Fruit, continues to grow well in spite of the dry weather conditions, according to a report of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture. Most crops were beginning to show a need of moisture, but recent showers have helped.

"Except for some 'yellow leaf, which is due in most cases to scab and spray injury, the foliage is excellent and with satisfactory growing conditions during the balance of the season the fruit should size well and the quality should be good."

"In well sprayed orchards the insects and diseases are well under control. Present indications are that the July drop will not be heavy."

"Prospects are for a crop of from 70 to 80 per cent of last year. Cherries promise to be a good crop in many places, but plums will be very light and pears much lighter than last year. Due to the extremely dry weather, strawberries will be a light crop in most sections of the province. The 'gray-banded leaf-roller' is quite numerous in some districts. Growers who are following the sod-mulch system should apply the under-leaf spray immediately. There is some 'fall-worm' showing in places. This should be controlled by a late-arsenical spray or by cutting off and burning all infested twigs. This insect attacks many forest and shade trees and may occur in any part of the province. Grasshoppers are reported to be numerous on the dyked lands in parts of Kings and Hants counties."

From the Annapolis Valley comes a report that the apple crop will be of exceptionally high quality. Coupling this with a report that the English crop will be light, the fruit-growers are optimistic. And there is a 10 per cent British duty against foreign apples, in favor of Empire-grown fruit.
