## Dorothy Dix Says—

### HUSBANDS HIT TOBOGGAN WHEN THEY BECOME BORES

#### Wives Can Find Much To Disillusion Them After The Marriage, So Men Must Watch Their Steps

We hear a great deal more about philandering husbands than we do about philandering wives, probably because there are more of the one than there are of the other. Likewise, there are various other reasons why most wives walk the straight-and-narrow path, while husbands jump the bars so often that they seem to be engaged in a hurdle race. Babies for instance, cramp the style of the most flirtatious married lady, but while Mamma stays at home and minds Junior, the youngster's howls not infrequently drive Papa to the jazz palaces to drown his sorrows in the arms of a girl who is more afraid of Mrs. Grundy than men are, and respect for the conventions is the beginning of virtue with the feminine sex. Furthermore, wives keep their eyes from roaming because husbands do not forgive and forget the side-stepping of erring wives. They haul them into the divorce court and lose their homes and shopping tickets, which is a pretty stiff price to pay for a little romance under the rose, which wasn't so rosy after all. 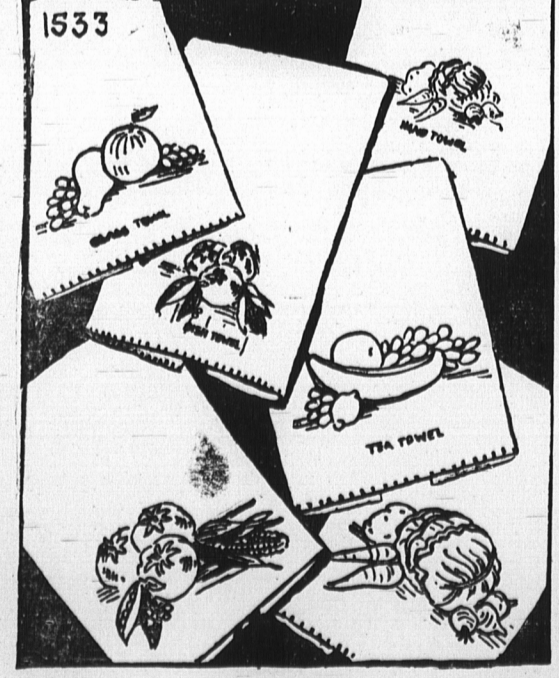

## Home Lessons Cure for Dance-Floor Apologies



Learn Steps from Diagram "The Excuse-me's"—this unhappy pair of dancers should be called. Every other step they take in the smart Westchester brings crushed toes, bumped knees and a flood of apologies.

Such accidents don't beset your dancing if you practise steps at home. Then you glide easily along, make a hit with your partner.

And simple to learn steps from diagrams. Begin with the Open Two-Step from the Westchester shown here.

Count 1—Quickly step forward on left foot, putting weight on heel first, then shifting weight to ball of foot. AND—Quickly step forward on ball of right foot. 2—Slowly step forward on left foot, with weight on heel first.

To avoid crushed toes, the girl should take as long a step back as possible. Knee bumping is usually the result of dancing directly in front of your partner. The girl should be slightly to one side, looking over her partner's right shoulder.

CREPEY NECK ISN'T PART OF BEAUTY

To revive the skin of the neck, and remove any crepe-like appearance, sit erect, force the head back as far as it will go, purse the lips, then thrust them out. Gradually and firmly turn the head to the left and practice placing the left ear on the left shoulder, at the same time keeping the mind fixed on thrusting out the lips more and more as the head is forced over to the side. Relax and return to normal position. Repeat three times to the left, side, and three times to the right.
