## NEWS IS CHEERING

### From All Over The Dominion

## VOICES OF PROVINCE

### Speak with No Uncertain sound.—A Review of Previous Elections on Temperance Questions.

Montreal, Sept. 21.—The electors of the Dominion will go to the polls on Thursday, Sept. 29, to record their votes for or against the prohibition of the liquor traffic. Over plebiscites during the past half dozen years have been taken in Ontario, Manitoba, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, and the aggregated result has been 266,498 votes for prohibition, and 133,580 against, or a majority of 132,918 in favor of prohibiting the liquor traffic. The present occasion is of national, and not merely provincial importance, and the Toronto "Globe" has obtained a review of the situation all over the Dominion from its correspondents. These are generally very encouraging to prohibition workers and indicate that the whole of the province will record majorities in favor of prohibition. A brief

synopsis of the reports from each province follows:—

### ONTARIO.

Toronto, Sept. 19.—Mr. F. S. Spence, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, whose finger records the pulse-beats of the temperance organism all over Canada, was seen at his office in the Confederation Life Building, and gave his views in answer to a question as to whether, now that the time for taking the plebiscite is drawing pretty near, he finds as much interest taken in the question as he anticipated. He said:—The interest is very great, and is growing rapidly. One of the best evidences of this is the thoroughness of the organization we have secured. Our people are working very hard, although very quietly. There has not been much fuss about their efforts, but a great deal has been accomplished. There are nearly two weeks yet to elapse before the day of voting. Sometimes great electoral contests are won or lost in a much shorter period. We are not likely to have so large a vote on the whole as we had on the provincial plebiscite, or as would be polled if some other voting took place at the same time. Generally speaking, we look confidently for a large majority in the province on Qatario.

### QUEBEC.

Mr. J. H. Carson, secretary of the Dominion Alliance and organizer for the prohibitionists in Quebec province, has been engaged in temperance work for many years, and is well qualified to express an opinion upon the subject. He is sanguine as to the result in the whole Dominion, and with regard to Quebec is quoted as saying:—I am positive that there will be a majority of votes for prohibition in this province. We are thoroughly organized in the English-speaking districts. Church and temperance societies are doing great work there, and we are sure to roll up a big majority. The liquor men do not seem to be organized. At least they are not fighting openly. In many of the French counties there is a strong feeling for temperance, which is encouraged by the clergy. The people do not completely understand what is meant by prohibition, but they do know that it is a measure in favor of temperance, and will vote for it.

### MANITOBA.

Winnipeg, Sept. 19.—The campaign in Manitoba has been losing momentum in the fact that the Methodist General Conference has taken to Toronto a number of the prominent laymen and ministers, such as the Rev. Dr. Sparling, the Rev. L. Gaetz, the Rev. Thos. Argue, the Hon. J. W. Sifton, Mr. Thos. Nixon and others. Before they left for Toronto the Hon. J. W. Sifton and Mr. Thos. Nixon waited on His Grace Archbishop Langevin, at the palace St. Boniface, to ascertain his views. His Grace assured them that he was with them, and entirely sympathized with the cause of temperance. The general feeling of citizens is that prohibition will be carried in Manitoba by about the same majority in proportion to the total vote as in 1892. Some feel, of course, that it would have been better had the vote been taken at the next general election, but this is not causing any of the workers to slacken their efforts.

### NOVA SCOTIA.

Halifax Sept. 19.—The outlook at the present time, so far as it can be accurately gauged, is:—(1) That Nova Scotia will give a substantial majority in favor of prohibition; but, (2) that the vote will be smaller than in 1894. There is confessedly a large amount of lethargy and indifference among the temperance people on this question, even in such banner temperance counties as Pictou and Colchester. The lethargy is in some measure due to the fact that there is no open active effort being put forth by the liquor interests against prohibition calculated to arouse the temperance people and evoke vigorous effort on their part.

### NEW BRUNSWICK.

St. John, N.B., Sept. 19.—From all indications at present, there seems to be hardly a doubt but that the plebiscite will be sustained in New Brunswick Counties outside of St. John, with

the exception of one or two, will give the measure large majorities. Two counties may vote against it, but the vote is expected to be very close, and will be offset by the large majorities in the other counties. Regarding St. John city, your correspondent spoke to a number of people who voted against the adoption of the Scott act, and they said they would vote for the plebiscite. The feeling, so far as can be judged from people who are met on the streets of the city, is in favor of the measure. The parishes in St. John county will go strongly in favor of prohibition. The sentiment throughout the province is towards temperance.

### PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Charlottetown, Sept. 19.—Judging by past history, and by present sentiment and conditions, the outlook for prohibition in this province can be considered only as highly favorable. Prince Edward Island has the happy singularity of being the banner temperance province of the Dominion, for previous to the repeal of the Scott act in Charlottetown in 1877, the entire province was under that law, and when the provincial prohibition vote was secured in 1893 the county of King's rolled up the magnificent vote of six to one in favor, which is unequalled in country voting in Canada. At that time prohibition carried in the Island by 6,118 to 1,923. The vote on the question of prohibition and the majority for prohibition on Sept. 29 promises to be as large as in December, 1893. On a careful survey of the field the conclusion appears to be just that this island will vote four to one in favor of prohibition on Thursday, Sept. 29.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

A Victoria, B. C., correspondent, writes: The cities of the coast are fairly well organized in the interests of prohibition. A provincial branch of the Dominion Alliance has been formed, with headquarters at Vancouver, and local branches have also been formed in each of the other cities. An organizer has been sent into the interior of the province, and the usual adjuncts to organization are being formed in various sections. Divided into electoral divisions, the following results may be looked for:—

Victoria electoral division, small majority.  
Vancouver Island, small minority.  
Burrard Inlet, an even vote.  
Westminster, moderate majority.  
Yale-Cariboo, fairly large minority.

## PRIZES AT MANILLA

### Worth \$1,500,000.—Chinese Emperor's Life in Danger.—Paris Papers Denounce Proceedings in Dreyfus Case.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—[Special]—Orders have been sent to Cuba that no further delays will be brooked in the evacuation of the island. The Spanish must get out at once.

MANILA, Sept. 23.—[Special]—The wrecks of the Spanish warships have been blown up with gun cotton. The prizes of the Americans in all kinds of bay and river craft aggregate a million and a half of dollars.

PEKIN, Sept. 24.—(Special)—The Emperor's life is believed to be in danger as the Dywageit Express deires to place Prince Kingso, her grandson on the throne.

The Emperor is aware of the conspiracy and has doubled the guards on the palace.

PARIS, Sept. 23.—(Special)—All the papers here denounce the military coup in the Dreyfus case and condemn General Zurlinden for prosecuting Col. Picquart.

Some blame the President for complicity, in the military plot.

## NOT HALF WAS TOLD

### West India Storm Was Worse

## THAN FIRST REPORTED

### Ten Thousand Houses Destroyed in Barbadoes—Hundreds of Lives Lost in All the Islands—So Mail Reports say.

KINGSTON, Ja., Sept. 23.—(Special)—Mail advices from St. Vincent, St. Lucia and Barbadoes show that first reports of the hurricane were not exaggerated.

Three hundred lives were lost in St. Vincent and its coast strewn with wrecks and many houses destroyed.

At St. Lucia 130 lives were lost but the damages were much less than at St. Vincent.

Ten thousand houses were destroyed at Barbadoes and many more damaged. Over 100 were killed and three quarters of the entire population left homeless.
