Stock Markets At A Glance

MONTREAL, Jan. 31 (CP) - The leading group attracted major interest today on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market and was higher. Newsprint prices were lower but higher than some late strength. Golds averaged easier except in spots.

TORONTO, Jan. 31 (CP) - The Gold Stocks registered a strong advance today on the Toronto Exchange, posting an index gain of 4.6 per cent in active trading. Index losses of 46 and 18 were posted respectively by the Base Metals and the rest of the day.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP) - The Stock Market passed off of Jan. 31 today with a modest net gain of 1/8 point. The closing was slightly higher than the month but with slightly less interest in the final session.

LONDON, Jan. 31 (CP) - Selective buying in industrial shares, particularly tobacco, was the chief feature in the Stock Market today. Home rails firm and oil quiet. International eased.

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (AP) - Grains weakened toward the close today when buying power dried up and it appeared that fairly large offerings were hanging over the market. Rye, which had been up about a cent at the time, backed down quickly and wheat grains followed. Selling in wheat came from weakness with southwestern connections.

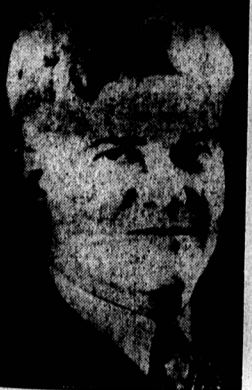

Crown Life Policies

Total \$ 308,167,791

TORONTO—Sturdy strength and notable growth of membership were reported last week at the annual meeting of the Crown Life Insurance Co. by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson president. Crown Life policies in force now number some 121,000 for a total amount of \$308,167,791. This figure takes no account of a large number of the annuities in force. Mr. Ferguson said all portions of the territory where the company operated have contributed to the increased business.

New policies issued during the year, including income bonds amounted to \$48,200,569 and the total insurance in force increased by \$31,540,502. Premiums received amounted to \$9,512,888, deposits on behalf of policyholders \$1,193,861, and investment income \$2,536,032, making total receipts \$13,236,452.

Death and disability claims paid amounted to \$1,240,406, the mortality record of the company continuing favorable, although somewhat higher than the unusually favorable experience of the past few years. Payments in settlement of matured and surrendered policies, less reinsurance, were \$1,051,188; annuity and other payments \$668,913; dividends to policyholders \$401,881; making total policy payments to policyholders and beneficiaries \$3,512,321.

During course of his remarks at the meeting, Mr. Ferguson said in part: "Thrift, economy, saving, are good discipline and yield good returns. Insurance provides the best and easiest method of maintaining these all. There can be no more convincing evidence of this than the great increase in the number of moderate sized policies that are being purchased in ever-increasing numbers. Eighty-five percent of our business of the past year made up of small policies issued by wage earners and to people of modest incomes in every walk of life. The policies are of wide variety both as to type and size because it is one of the primary essentials of any insurance system if it is to function efficiently and adequately, that policies must be fitted to the needs and circumstances of their particular owners. It is this ability to meet the needs of each individual that has done so much to make voluntary life insurance the great and useful institution that it is today."

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IN MEMORIAM

JOHN MURTAGH At his home in Newton, on January 5th, there occurred the death of John Murtagh at the age of 95 years.

His parents had emigrated from Ireland and he was born on the farm where he lived all his life, with enough relatives to help him for the past few years he was intensely interested in all farm activities, and often had to be prevailed upon to prevent him from taking an active part.

He had a clear and keen memory and could relate his recollection of many historical incidents among them his military training during the time of the Fenian Raids. He often related many incidents of his school days in the pioneer log school house, of his youth, of having walked to Seven Mile Bay Church where he was baptized and which was the nearest Catholic church at that time.

He was a citizen of sterling qualities and kindly disposition, and was always ready and willing to help his neighbours and friends, and his many acts of kindness will not soon be forgotten. He was charitable in speech and action and none came to his home who did not receive a hearty and welcome reception. For his life he was an exemplary father. He was kind, jovial and deeply interested in the welfare of his family. His cheerfulness and his triumphant spirit in his declining years will not soon be forgotten.

At the time of his death he was the oldest member of Kinkora parish, and the last of a generation of three brothers and one sister. His wife predeceased him in 1923. The surviving members of his family are Walter in Newton; Mrs. Philip Monaghan and Mrs. Martin Brennan in Kinkora; Alfred in Lewiston, Maine; Sergeant Mervyn with the American Armed Forces, Mary of Crystal Springs, Sask., and Thomas of Forgan, Sask.

The funeral which was largely attended, was held from his home on January 7th to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora. The funeral Mass was sung by his pastor, Right Reverend J. A. Murphy and interment took place in the family plot in the adjoining cemetery. The pall bearers were: W. P. McKenna, Albert McKenna, Aloysius Greenan, Gerald Greenan, Carl Greenan and Louis Mulligan.

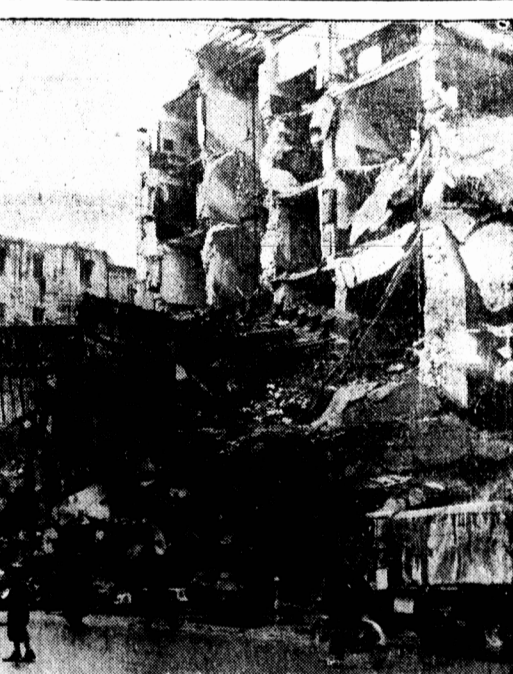
