

Mrs Artemas Lord Passes At Souris



THE LATE MRS. ARTEMAS LORD

A wide circle of friends learned with regret of the passing of Mrs. Artemas Lord which occurred early Wednesday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wilfred Wright, Souris. Her health had been failing for some time. She was formerly Miss Margaret Pennyfather Gray, daughter of Colonel James Hamilton Gray who presided at the historic conference at Charlottetown in 1864 which led to the Confederation of the provinces. Besides having the distinction of being the oldest living child of any of the Fathers of Confederation she was also the oldest person to be presented to their Majesties, King George and Queen Elizabeth during the memorable visit to this city in 1839. During the Confederation celebrations held in Charlottetown in July, 1939, the late Mrs. Lord attended the ceremonies at the Provincial Exhibition when a tablet in memory of her father was unveiled on the occasion of the 75th anniversary of the first meeting of the Fathers of Confederation. Besides witnessing the birth of Canada, she had a very interesting life. She was born at Point St. Charles, South Africa, on June 2, 1849. Her father was stationed there at that time with the 7th Dragoon Guards during the first Boer war. It was three months after her birth that her father, travelling three days and three nights over rugged country, first saw his infant daughter. Col. Gray had a distinguished and varied career. His father, Colonel Robert Gray who was born in Scotland came to Virginia at the outbreak of the Revolutionary War but had to flee the country because he was a Loyalist. He settled in Charlottetown and at Spring Park his son John Hamilton destined to be one of the Fathers of Confederation, was born. Mrs. Lord's mother, Susan Pennyfather, was born in the West Indies. Her father, Sir John Pennyfather, a British General, served with distinction in the Crimean War. Colonel Gray who was born in 1815, was educated in England and was in many parts of the world on military service. After he had come back to the island he built his home on North River, and called it Inkerman, after the famous battle of the Crimean War. He was Aide-de-Camp to Governor Dundas when the then Prince of Wales, afterwards Edward VII, visited Charlottetown in 1869. One of Mrs. Lord's sisters, Harriet, who married Rev. Henry Stokes, was born at Aden. Another, Mrs. Frederick Peters, who is residing with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. Dewdney, Manager of the Bank of Montreal, and Mrs. Dewdney in
