NEW YORK, Oct. 8 — (AP) — Steel production dropped again yesterday in the United States, due in part to labor troubles in coal fields.

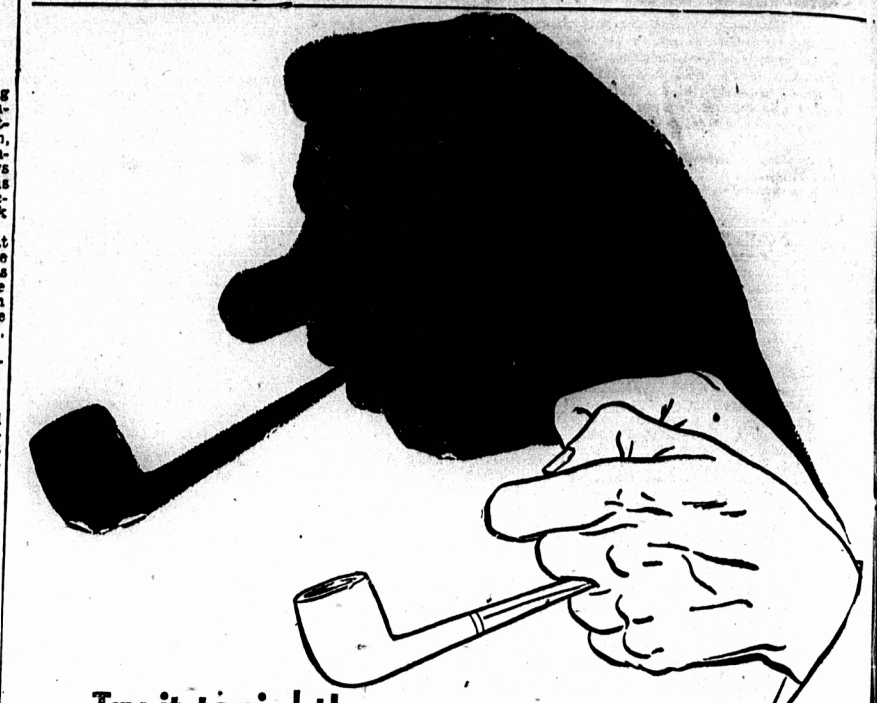
