IN MEMORIAM

ELDRIDGE G. SPENCER

Friends throughout the province heard with regret of the passing of Eldridge Geddie Spencer, Supervisor of the Bank of Nova Scotia, which occurred at his home in Toronto on June 25th after an illness of three weeks.

Deceased who was a son of Mrs. and the late Rev. W. H. Spencer, was born in Georgetown in Sept. 1886, receiving his early education in Montague, where his father was at that time stationed.

Subsequently he attended Prince of Wales College and after graduating, taught school at Union Road for one year.

He then entered the Bank of Nova Scotia at Charlottetown where by his honesty, aptness and strict attention to duty, he rapidly arose in the service.

After a year in the local branch he was transferred to Glace Bay, then to Oxford, N. S., after which he was sent to Campbellton, N. B.

In 1909 he was promoted to the supervisors staff at head office, Toronto, where after some years of labor his worth was recognized and in 1919 he was promoted to the responsible position of supervisor.

The late Mr. Spencer was a young man of irrefragable character and extremely popular in his adopted home. He has been called to his eternal reward in the prime of life with a bright future in store for him, but there remains the memory of a kind and loving husband and father, and God fearing churchman.

He leaves to mourn, his widow, (nee Besie Griffiths of Toronto), and a daughter, Elizabeth Shirley, 13 years old, his mother, one brother, Willard G., of the Imperial Life Association staff, and a sister, Mrs. A. C. Sinclair, all of this city, also survive.

North Wiltshire Jersey Show

Over two hundred people attended the Jersey Show and Field Day at North Wiltshire on Tuesday. The meeting was held at the beautiful farm of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Clark an ideal place for such an outing.

There were nearly fifty head of Jersey females shown, and it was the general opinion that there were not very many Maritime Shows ever held that had a better lineup of Jerseys.

Mr. George Haslam, Bradalbane, was chairman, and James Bremner, Eastern Jersey Fieldman, reviewed some of the work of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, and told of the position that the Jersey cow now holds in Canadian Agriculture. He stressed the position of the purebred breeder in the community and the many methods at the disposal of the pure bred breeder to market his stock. The pure bred breeder is an efficiency expert, developing strains and breeds of cattle that can make more economic use of their food and to be a good progressive live stock breeder requires more ability and skill than most people are aware of. However, the live stock men must advertise his stock and above all he must be honest in his dealings.

Louis W. Roper, Federal Cattle Promoter, was present, and gave a short talk on the assistance given club work and other activities. He strongly urged the purchase of better cattle at the present time, for 1932 would go down in history as the year of bargains.

Walter Shaw, Live Stock Superintendent, was to have been present, but, unfortunately for the Jersey breeders he had to attend a meeting of the Fox Breeders.

C. E. MacKenzie, Milton, spoke a few minutes and brought greetings for the Holstein Association.

Four classes of young cattle were then judged by Harold Stead, of Charlottetown, assisted by Mr. Bremner.

The Junior calves were a nice lot and the class was won by William R. Clark, with a beautiful daughter of "Silver Dollar," the famous Jersey Sire at head of the herd of Walter Clark. Bruce MacDonald showed a beautiful calf by the same sire, but as it was young it was not placed up, however, it is one of the best prospects at the show. The get of "Silver Dollar," "Prince of Valley View 2nd," and "Brampton Snowdrop Hero" showed up extra well. All three sires are giving the same type of offspring, which is a great asset in a community.

In the aged cow class in milk no one agreed with the judges in their placing, and there was considerable discussion. However, this class probably brought out more than all the other classes combined. The following is a list of the prize winners:

Women Would Have Future Food Prepared

TORONTO, July 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Mail and Empire in "The Woman's Point of View" says: "Already women who see farther than tomorrow's bride, are getting uneasy about next Winter and are asking whether last Summer's crop of thumb-widling is to be followed this Summer and Fall they want to know—and we wish they would ask governments, provincial, municipal and institutional these questions as well as questioning us—what is going to be done to conserve this year's crop? They want to know how many institutions, that are everlastingly clamoring for grants which all come out of the taxpayer, have taken advantage of strawberries as three and five cents a box. They want to know whether the homes and corrective and punitive establishments are going to buy fruit when it is at its lowest and do it up, as the saying is; whether they are going to lay in a sufficient store of root vegetables when the price is also low, to do them through the Winter and till next year's stuff comes. They want to know why authority, which is spending millions in direct relief, (and so reducing respectable citizens to the level of paupers), does not organize groups for fruit picking, instead of allowing the jobbers to buy up crops at a low figure, the fruit being left to rot on vines or trees in order that the price may be kept up, for in the jobbers' view, the 50 cents made on one basket is clearer gain than the 25 cents made on two. Will our women ask these questions in public meetings as persistently as they ask them amongst themselves?"

Airship Akron Is Assisting

LAKEHURST, N. J., July 6.—The U. S. Naval Airship Akron, equipped to fly the Atlantic to Bermuda if necessary, went aloft last night to assist in the search for the missing Ketch Curlew.
