REGINA, May 1—(C. P.)—Whisperings are rife concerning Hon. J. F. Bryant's pride, Wascana Lake, that spreads its beautiful surface before Saskatchewan's legislative building. Now dammed up and full of what a lake is supposed to have, Wascana is said to be causing not a little worry to Mr. Bryant, minister of public works in the provincial cabinet.

One cabinet minister, says the report, wanted to know what the premium was. Many are sure the water will be protected by order-in-council to prevent it running over the dam.
