MOCK PARLIAMENT met last night with speaker Smith in the chair. William Scott in continuing the debate on the Empire Bill said that this although the measure for the confederation of the Empire was not above criticism yet the bill was one which would prove itself to be a measure productive of beneficial results. Calvin McCallum thought that the proposed confederation was rendered impossible by the great differences between the various people and the diversity of their interests. History has conclusively proved that a union of people whose interests were not in common has ever brought about their disintegration. W. H. Watts said that this measure would consolidate more closely the different parts of the Empire, and this united Empire will be a great factor for the world's peace. Louis G. Hazard contended that Canada is unable to bear the increased taxation, which would be imposed and that the people would not feel disposed to shoulder part of Great Britain's national debt. House then adjourned till January 29th inst.

A SOCIAL in aid of St. Ann's Church, was held in Hope River hall on Monday evening, January 14th. Notwithstanding the bad condition of the roads, quite a large number were present who heartily enjoyed the interesting program. Each number was performed in a most admirable manner. Rev. A. McAllister's address was both entertaining and instructive. The baskets were auctioned by Joseph LeClere.

A MEETING of the Pharmaceutical Association of this Province was held in the city Monday, the president, Hon. Geo. E. Hughes in the chair. Routine business was transacted, and the applications of Victor Coyle and Frank Hennessey for examination were accepted, the examinations to be held on January 31st. R. M. Johnson is Secretary-Registrar of the Association, and D. O. M. Reddin, Treasurer.

F. O. NORTON a graduate of Prince of Wales College, and at one time principal of the New Glasgow High School recently received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Chicago with unusual distinction. For the past three years he has been a Fellow in the University of Chicago, and at present is Professor of Greek in Drake University Des Moines, Iowa, a position to which he was selected at the beginning of the present school year. For two years of his residence in the University of Chicago he was instructor in Greek in that institution. Doctor Norton is a brother of E. S. Norton of Brudenell, P. E. I., of E. H. Norton, Charlottetown, and J. F. Norton, formerly of Cardigan.

THE cases of John McMurrer and Joseph Matthews vs. Prosecutor Robert Walker, were before the Supreme Court on Monday and Tuesday, Mr. Justice Hodgson presiding in both cases. In these cases there were issues of law raised by way of demurrer to be tried by the Court, and issues of fact to be tried by the jury. On those issues of fact, it was for the jury to determine whether the defendant was a party to the alleged trespasses committed by the seizure of the goods, whether the goods were owned by the plaintiffs and if both questions were determined for the plaintiffs, what were the damages suffered, such damages to be contingent on the Court afterwards determining the questions of law in favor of the plaintiffs. An order had previously been made by Mr. Justice Hodgson that the issues of fact be tried by the jury, before the issues of law were argued before the Court, and accordingly a jury was summoned on Monday. The plaintiffs in both cases proved that the Defendant Jenkins had caused search warrants to be issued by Alder Pughart, Sijpendary Magistrate for Queen's County, and placed in the hands of Constable James S. Walker, by whom the beer in both cases was seized. They contended that, because the Prosecutor, in applying for the search warrants, had disclosed no grounds to the Magistrate of his suspicion and belief, as required by the Prohibition Act, the Magistrate never acquired any jurisdiction to issue the warrants, and that any acts done thereunder would be wrongful, and that besides, the Statute under which they were issued being ultra vires of the local Legislature as to forfeiture of goods, afforded no protection to the defendant for his acts. They submitted that pending the decisions on these questions by the Court, the question of trespass must be pursued to the venire go to the jury, and they be asked to assess the damages. They further contended that, although the trespasses were proved to have been directly committed by Constable Walker, the defendant, by not denying by his plea, the agency set forth in the declaration, or statement of plaintiff's claim, had

had therefore admitted this agency on the record; but in any event the evidence of the Defendant's applying for the search warrant, and afterwards submitting Walker's evidence as his witness to the Magistrate and thereon asking the Magistrate to destroy the goods, was sufficient evidence of such agency to go to the jury, admitting for the time being, that all proceedings before the Magistrate were illegal and of no effect. The Court, however, on a motion of non-suit on behalf of the defendant, ruled that until the questions of law be determined in favor of the plaintiff, such evidence of agency could not go to the jury, and there being therefore nothing to connect the defendant with the alleged trespasses, a non-suit was directed in both cases, the right to plaintiffs to move as to the questions of law being reserved. The plaintiffs will now have the questions of law heard at this Term, and have asked for time to apply for a rule to have non-suit set aside, and to have the questions of fact again placed before the jury at the next June term of the Court. The questions of law on demurrer will likely be argued next week before the full Court, it is understood that in the McMurrer case, the right to seize liquors imported from another Province for the plaintiff's own use, will come up as a constitutional question, and that in the Matthews case, the right to seize liquors belonging to a third person against whom there was no evidence of selling will also be argued from a constitutional point of view. Neil McQuarrie, K. C., and E. O. Brown for plaintiffs, Attorney-General Peters and H. James Palmer, K. C., for defendant. The case of Dorinda Louise Lane vs. Thomas P. Lane and another, action for damages arising from the scalding of a cow, was argued yesterday. Verdict was given for the defendants. Matheson and Brauhart for plaintiff; Hazard, K. C. and Hazard for defendants.
