Livestock Market

MONTREAL, Aug. 7.—Cattle receipts 223. There were twenty cars reported and 300 cattle left over from yesterday. Yesterday's cattle were sold on a slow market at prices estimated to be on the average about 50 cents lower than those of the previous week. Good steers sold from \$10.25 to \$11.00 with fairly plain to medium steers from \$9.00 to \$10.00 and common light steers down to \$8.00. Straight lots of good cows were sold at \$7.75 with a few choice cows picked out at \$8.25 with an odd butcher bull for \$7.00 or better.

Quotations—Butcher steers good \$10.25 to \$11.00, medium \$9.25 to \$10.00, common \$8.00 to \$9.00. Butcher heifers—Medium \$8.00 to \$9.00, common \$7.00 to \$8.00. Butcher cows—Good, \$7.75 to \$8.00, medium \$4.75 to \$7.00, canners \$3.00 to \$3.50, cutters \$3.75 to \$4.50, butcher bulls, common \$5.00 to \$6.25. Calf receipts 265. The calf market was strong with grassers selling mostly for \$6.50 or better. Good veals sold around \$12.00. Sheep receipts 294. Good lambs brought \$14.00 and mixed lots from \$13.00 to \$13.50. Hog receipts 488. The hog market was strong, stand-

ard quotation was \$13.75 fed and watered. Sows brought from \$9.00 to \$10.00.
