In winning the western horseman stake at the State Fair here the other day, General Todd, owned by Henry Brea, of Pittsburg, established a new world's record for 3-year-old stallion, when he paced the second heat in 2.04 1/4. General Todd paced the first heat in 2.05 1/4. The track was heavy.

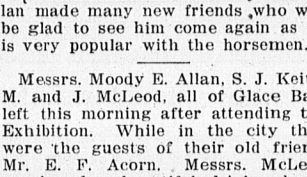

Directum, 1.58, established a new world's record of 1.56 3/4 for a mile paced without a wind shield, Captain Shaw, of Cleveland, drove Peter Mac in 2.06 1/4, a new amateur mark for a mile track. The world's champion four-year-old trotter, Peter Volo, 2.02, driven by Thomas Murphy, equalled his record.

Candy Girl won the 2.18 trot and pace at Presque Isle after it had gone five heats. The last three of which she trotted. Rose Direct got the first and Dan G. the second. The latter made the best time of the race when she stepped her second mile in 2.16 3/4.
