HINTS FOR The Motorist BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH

STARTER MOTOR STALLS



H. R. writes: Of late, my starting motor will not crank the engine. It turns until the pinion meshes, and then stops. If I press the starting button when the lights are on, they go out. I am sure that the battery is charged and that the starter drive is all right. What is the matter?

Answer: Either the engine turns over abnormally hard, perhaps because some of its moving parts have recently been tightened or else there is an extra high electrical resistance somewhere in the starter circuit, which prevents the motor from developing the required torque. If the engine cranks very hard, by hand, it is not strange that the motor balks at turning it over. Imperfect connections of the battery cables to the battery terminals, to the ground on the frame or to the starter switch or bad connections in the switch itself or at the brushes of the motor, will introduce excessive resistance. While the battery may have been given the full charge which it will take deterioration of the plates will deprive it of the power to supply the immense current required in starting.

BATTERY TERMINALS CORRODE W. H. asks: What makes the connection of my storage battery become covered with green corrosion so frequently? I clean them thoroughly but they keep on gathering this substance?

Answer: There is an escape of acid which eats the metal of the connections. This acid may be stopped out of the vent holes in the filler-caps, because the cells are filled too full and perhaps because the battery is so placed up on the car as to be jolted unusually hard. It may be sprayed out of the filter-vents in case the battery is overcharged for long periods or it may creep up the terminals posts. If the sealing in of the cover has not been thoroughly done, you should avoid overfilling, and protect the terminal posts and you should wipe off the whole battery top, with waste moistened in ammonia water, at short intervals.

IGNITION TIMING QUESTIONS R. G. asks: (1) How many degrees of spark advance, as measured on the flywheel, should be allowed for each 100 revolutions per minute of engine speed? (2) Do the bore and stroke make any difference as to this? (3) Does one ignition system require more advance than another? (4) Which is the quicker, the distributor system or the vibrator coil system?

Answer: (1) Conditions vary so much that no generally applicable figure can be given. Merely as an illustration, an ordinary engine might require 40 degrees or more at 2,000 r. p. m. and 5 degrees at 400 r. p. m. for best results. (2) The bore is supposed to make considerable difference, more advance being required with its increase. (3) Yes, considerable. The high-tension magneto requires less than most others. (4) The distributor system is considered the quicker.

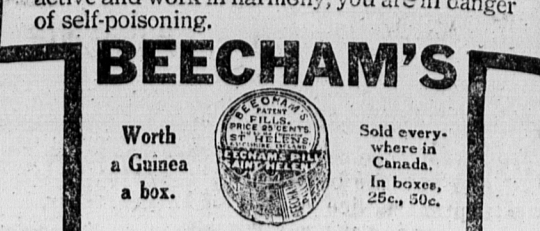
