**A DRY SEASON.**

It is customary to speak in superlatives regarding unusual climatic occurrences. A good healthy snowstorm, an unusually heavy rain, a heavy thunderstorm, etc. is often regarded as the "biggest" of its kind. Similarly the present prolonged dry spell is looked upon by many as the greatest drought in many years. It is a bad one no doubt and although unusual, is not without precedent and we have lived through them all with comparatively little damage. There have been equally prolonged periods of dry weather and although some of the crops were light they generally averaged up better than had been anticipated. This year the hay crop will be light in many parts of the province but so far the grain and root crops have not sustained permanent injury and it is quite probable that, as in former years, the rain will come in time to save the situation. There is a general drouth over the eastern half of the continent both in Canada and the United States. Many parts of the west have been well watered, some of them too well. In Europe also there is a more than ordinarily prolonged drought and indications are that the world harvest will fall some what short of average. Short crops usually mean higher prices and it is quite possible that any shortage that may occur as a result of the droughts will be compensated for in higher prices. In any case nothing can be gained by grousing over it.

The Cross of Sacrifice was erected by France in grateful remembrance of what Canada did for her freedom and the freedom of the world in the great war of 1914-1918. Over sixty thousand Canadian graves tell with mute eloquence what Canada did, what she sacrificed and of these thousands, more than five hundred are from homes in Prince Edward Island. Surely we too have cause to remember the sacrifice, cause to transmit to future generations—Forever and Ever—the proud record of our little province in the world's greatest war and the world's greatest triumph.

Yet, apart from a few small monuments erected in rural communities, erected by neighbors and friends in grateful remembrance of their sacrifice, there is not a stone or a tablet to tell future generations what the province did or even that it had any part in the war. This is not as it should be. When Canada became a nation through valour and sacrifice we did our proud part; our province found its soul in sacrifice and in duty; we were justly proud of both and we have already almost forgotten both.

"We live among the ruins and echoes of Armageddon. Its shadow is receding backward into history." The history of the war will be written in years to come. "Forever and ever" it will be a central FACT period in history. Henceforth "before the great war" and "after the great war" will be the epoch marks of history. Our children and children's children will read of it in their school books. Will they remember that their ancestors shared in the glory and the sacrifice? Will there be a monument sufficiently imposing to impress upon them the greatness of the event or will they measure its greatness by church tablets and small monuments in country churchyards.

Is it not high time that some move were made not only to commemorate this colossal event in history but to pay fitting tribute to our brave dead?




