### Alberta Specializing In Bronze Turkeys

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND  
CAN DO THE SAME

The problem of managing the turkey flock in such a way as to produce a maximum of top grade dressed birds, is one of interest to producers. Each year too many turkeys are graded down through lack of finish or insufficient fleshing. No doubt this could be remedied to some extent with better feeding methods. Nevertheless, there are many properly killed, well dressed birds that would not qualify for top grade had they been reared under the best of conditions.

There is sufficient spread in price between the various grades to justify special effort on the part of the turkey producer to manage his flock in a manner that will command no-tion top grades. Unquestionably, much progress has been made since buying on a graded basis was instituted some years ago, yet still further gains could be realized by greater care in the selection of breeding stock. The importance of securing breeders with market type requirements cannot be overestimated. It is equally true of turkeys as in other kinds of meat animals, that there are types, irrespective of breed, that will utilize feed to better advantage than others, types that will make more economical gains and fatten more easily.

The desirable type will not be found in all farm flocks. In the majority of flocks there may be only a few. However, much could be done to improve the quality of market turkeys, and consequently the returns in dollars and cents, by selecting the best of the females for breeders; and using an approved, banded tom to mate with them. The best time to choose breeding stock is just prior to the marketing season when the best birds can be more easily detected than any other time. The choice should be made only from those in the best market condition. This will insure not only vitality but early maturity, which is so important where we have a comparatively short growing season. From these the best market type birds with a maximum of breast meat can be selected. The good type bird will have a broad shoulder and back, deep full breast, and a long, straight, level, or better still, a slightly rocker-shaped, keel bone. The best way to determine the shape of the

keel, or what is termed the balance of the bird, is to lay one hand along the back and the other along the breast bone. The nearer they are to being parallel, the better. Birds with prominent points or knobs on the front of the keel bone should be discarded, as should birds with crooked keel bones. The more flesh on either side of the breast bone the better. Long legged, narrow, slab-sided turkeys, or those showing evidence of late maturity, should be avoided. A relatively broad, deep head, free from coarseness, and a bright, prominent eye, indicate a strong constitution. However, in selecting breeding stock as outlined above, it will likely be found that the strongest heads in the flock will be among those that conform in other respects.

While keeping vigor and body type uppermost in mind in selecting breeding stock, size need not be sacrificed. Neither should standard color be lost if careful and intelligent selection is made.

### Asks Attention To Mr. Bennett's Words Of Advice

(Canadian Press)

MELBOURNE, Nov. 25—The Argus editorially describes as "excellent advice that should not go unheeded" the suggestion of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett at a civic reception that Australia keep in mind its great destiny as a nation. The touring ex-prime minister of Canada counselled against thinking too much about state and city.

The Argus said the customary Australian courtesy might profitably be extended to the opinions of a distinguished visitor from a far country, and went on:

"They are the opinions of one who knows and loves the British Empire and has a lively appreciation of the great part which the Commonwealth must inevitably play in the future of that Empire."

"Australians know in a general way that the future cannot but hold a great destiny for their land. Yet the people who talk most about the great future are general in their statements and vague in their thoughts. To them 'the long wash of Australasian seas' is a symbolical as well as a physical boundary. That any outsider should ever be so impertinent as to challenge the title of Australians to Australia is unimaginable."

"When Mr. Bennett bade Australians look beyond the horizon he contemplated a spiritual excursion into both space and time. It is not too fanciful to picture Australia as something more than a steadily-growing unit of the Empire. Science may or may not ever conquer vast areas of the interior now believed to be uncultivable."

The whole system of official inspection is designed to promote production of better market type birds which reach standard weight early in the season and have a maximum of standard excellence. From among these best flocks in the Province only the outstanding specimens are banded and classified according to grade before being offered for sale. Turkey producers would do well to use banded toms to head their flocks. The benefit derived from the use of such sires is obvious. The greatest cash return through improvement in grade and increased weight will more than offset the extra cost price.
