PENNSYLVANIA HAS COLD STORAGE LAW

HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 13.—The cold storage act passed by the last Pennsylvania legislature, and which is believed to be the first law of its kind enacted by any of the States, will come into effect tomorrow.

The principal purpose of the law is to limit the time in which eggs, butter, poultry, etc., may be held in storage. It also contains other important provisions relating to the sanitation and equipment of cold storage warehouses.

All cold storage plants are required to take out a State license. Not only the merchant cold storage warehouses but all similar plants attached to hotels, restaurants and hospitals, in which food is stored for more than 30 days, will be required to comply with the provisions of the new law.

NEGRO LOST HIS LIFE TRYING TO WIN BET

KINGSTON, Aug. 12.—Daniel Royle, head baker on the R. & O. steamer Kingston, was drowned today while attempting to win a bet. Short ly after the boat docked at Prescott Royle left the kitchen, where the temperature was 110 degrees and made a wager that he could recover a walking stick which had been thrown into the river. Diving from the deck of the steamer, Royle had gone only a short distance when he began to cry for help. The strong current, combined with the ice-cold water proved too much for him. Hundreds of passengers heard him and the unfortunate man sank to death. A colored water named Waters attempted in vain to recover the body. Royle was a negro, the chef, who had been his friend for the past twenty years, is grief-stricken over his death.

THE WEATHER. Yesterday was mild and sunshiny, clear at night. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 80 degrees above zero and the lowest was 64 above.

The lowest temperature the previous night was 56 above. At nine a. m. it was 63 above and at nine p. m. 64.

The tide will be high this morning at 7.51 and tomorrow at 8.53; it will be high tonight at 10.13 and tomorrow at 10.57.

The sun sets this evening at 7.11 and tomorrow at 7.10; it rises tomorrow at 4.59 and Saturday at 5. The moon rises this evening at 6.41.

The first quarter of the moon was on Saturday, Aug. 9th, at 12.05 a. m. The moon will be full Saturday, Aug. 16th, at 4.39 p. m. The length of today will be fourteen hours and thirteen minutes.

PARIS, Aug. 12 (Special)—It is stated that the French government is watching a series of extraordinary experiments at Havre with an invention of a man named Tlivi, who is said to have discovered means for projecting ultra-violet rays a distance of fourteen miles and exploding gunpowder contained in a metallic box.
