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Caledonia's Contribution To Science

Sir.—A year ago I wrote Mr. R. MacRae of the Commonwealth Edison Company, Chicago, for a paper on Lord Kelvin, the famous Scottish scientist, as a reading for our Caledonian Club course of lectures, 1928-29. He could not then comply, but later prepared a paper on "Caledonia's Contribution to Science," which contained a reference to Lord Kelvin.

When here last August he promised to send me a copy of the paper, which I received later, with a note stating I could use it in any way deemed best.

And as you, Mr. Editor, have been for years with me on the Lecture Committee of the Club, I would like to have your opinion in the matter. Should you favour publishing the paper I am agreed, but would like to preface a few words regarding the interesting career.

Mr. MacRae is a native of Pinetree, Belfast, a son of the late Donald MacRae of the Ponds Settlement. After attending a session at Dalhousie College, Halifax, and distinguishing himself as a student, he decided to quit college and "follow the sea," as he says it was a choice between becoming a "minister or a sea captain." He chose the latter and joined the barque "J. H. Myrick" bound for Liverpool, his brother Donald being the master.

During their lay-up in Liverpool he took a chance for a prize offered in the entrance exams of Glasgow University, but having only a few weeks to brush up, the prospect was not encouraging. However when the results were published, he was listed as having captured the leading prize of £60. As this prize was open to the world no objection was offered

and Mrs. George McNeill. His boyhood days were spent there, but later he moved to Haverhill, Mass., to learn his trade as a builder. From Haverhill he came to Westley in 1902 and was in the employ of Maxson & Co., builders and contractors. When this firm dissolved, Mr. McNeill conducted a building business of his own, and in this was so occupied at the time of his death.

Mr. McNeill was three times married, his final marriage being with Mary Ellen Tremayne of Constantine, Cornwall, Eng. in 1925 who survives him. Others of the immediate family surviving are Miss Nina McNeill of California, Miss Nellie of Providence, Miss Alma of Boston. Mrs. Fanny Story of North Scituate, Mass., Mrs. Maudie Gilcrest of Haverhill, Mass., sisters, and Artemus McNeill, a brother, of Prince Edward Island. There are also several nephews and nieces.

Mr. McNeill had no lodge affiliations, but he was an earnest worker and member of the First Baptist Church. For years he had served as chairman of the Board of Trustees and for a time was superintendent of the Sunday School. He also served the church in other capacities. He was an ardent advocate of prohibition and did much to further its cause before the days of the 18th amendment.

The date of his funeral is yet to be determined.

Mrs. McNeill returned to the house soon after George and Ernest Coon, who were painting the McNeill home and who were in the garage with Mr. McNeill, hastened to the house when they noticed that Mr. McNeill had collapsed and told Mrs. McNeill of her husband's condition. Dr. J. Gordon Anderson was immediately summoned, but death had occurred before his arrival. Dr. Anderson said that the cause was undoubtedly a ruptured heart.

Mr. McNeill had lived until the 16th of this month, would have been 60 years old. He was born on Prince Edward Island, Can., the son of Mr.
