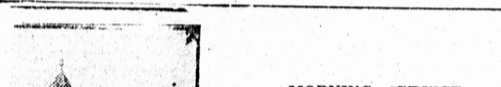

Both were built in 1931 by Vickers-Armstrong and have a displacement of 1,375 tons. They carry four 47-inch guns, one three-inch and seven small guns, besides eight 21-inch torpedo tubes. In trials the men-of-war exceeded 37 knots.
