HAVANA, Cuba, June 4 — (A.P.) — A mass meeting of sugar, commercial and industrial interests was held today to make plans to combat the two cent tariff on sugar imposed by the United States on imports from Cuba. Spokesmen declared the duty would ruin the Island's economic structure. A committee was appointed to determine what steps should be taken.

Hindenburg Is Now Dictator

BERLIN, June 5 — (A.P.) — President Paul Von Hindenburg became virtual dictator of Germany with the apparent approval of Adolf Hitler and his stormy Nazis. The formal action which put the veteran commander of the Kaiser's Imperial Armies in the saddle was a decree he personally issued dissolving the Reichstag — a move which sidestepped certain veto of the new "hitler" cabinet of Franz Von Papen. The dissolution, however, means that a general election will be mandatory within 90 days. It was indicated the date would be set by emergency decrees for sometime late in July. Such an election would give Hitler his chance to make good the claim that the Fascists would control the Reichstag if a general election were held.

The regular meeting of this troop was held in Birch Grove Hall Friday, May 27th, with 16 Scouts present.



Resignation of Greek Government

ATHENS, Greece, June 5 — (A.P.) — Greece was plunged anew into political turmoil by the resignation of the Government of Alexander Papanastasiou, who became Premier May 23 following the resignation of the Ministry headed by Eleutherios Venizelos. Premier Papanastasiou announced his resignation after a speech by M. Venizelos which, he said, gave him the impression the Government did not enjoy the confidence of the chamber. The veteran Venizelos surrendered his Ministry May 21 when legislation submitted to solve the nation's difficult financial problems was turned down by the legislature.

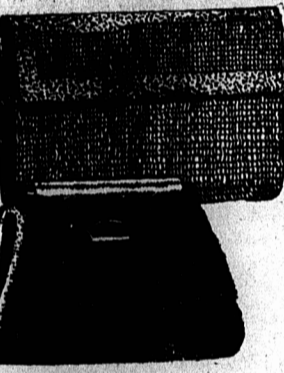
