## Abbies Nosed Out By Winnipeg Team In Closing Minutes

### Red Shirts Display Great Form In Opening Game Of Season — Close, Hard Fought Game Ends 2-1 With Visitors On Top.

A blazing, chest-high drive from the stick of A. Shibiicki gave the Winnipeg All-Stars a 2-1 victory over the Abbeys last night in an exhibition tilt played at the Forum.

It was the Westerners first win of their Maritime tour, having been held to a draw at Moncton and losing to the Wolverines at Halifax.

The visitors displayed a far better knowledge of the forward pass than the locals and worked themselves into scoring position time after time via this route.

After a rather listless opening period the teams set up a fast clip in the second and dished out a mid-season brand of hockey to the 1,500 fans present.

Spectacular net minding, rugged defensive work and forwards who back-checked themselves dizzy was only part of the tasty menu handed out as the two teams battled through the sixty minutes without a let-up.

For 34 minutes both goalies pulled off spectacular saves and then McQuade was forced to bow when Wilson poked Monson's pass into the mesh under the sliding body of "Kick" who had dove into the play in an effort to smother the disc.

The final session was underway only two minutes when McQuade penetrated McQuade's citadel, scoring from close in on a high fast drive. "Mickey" got a great hand on his well-earned goal.

It looked like a draw with only two minutes of playing time left, but Shibiicki's hard drive from well out caught the top corner of the net to give the Westerners a well-earned win.

McQuade was perhaps the outstanding man for the visitors, rising to spectacular heights to thwart Abbie sharpshooters, but Campbell, Monson and Malloy formed an effective attacking trio, Campbell in particular having loads of speed and displaying marked ability in stick-handling. "Kick" McQuade, small but mighty, turned in a brilliant performance between the pipes and showed the reason why he was classed as the Maritime's best two years ago when with Dalhousie. Another "mighty atom", Jackie Kane turned in a sweet game last night and with Pete Kelly, McGlashen, Bill Walker and Joey Beaton had the rival goalkeeper hopping around his cage turning aside burning drives from their hickories.

Taken man for man, the locals served notice to other Maritime teams that they will have to step to edge out Stan Jackson's red and black crew of 1933-34.

The winners have a smooth, fast-skating outfit, who know the game from start to finish and play it accordingly, their defence in particular making a hard road for incoming forwards to travel.

The teams started away rather slowly with the line of Hudson, Beaton and McArthur opposing Monson, Campbell and Malloy. Monson got the first shot on the net, McQuade turning it to the corner. Hudson and Beaton were within inches of scoring but McQuade was too good. Half way through the period Wilson was chased for tripping McGlashen, but, despite several close calls, the Pegs held on till their defenceman returned.

Kane received a great hand from the crowd as he pumped two hard drives at McQuade from close quarters. The pace was getting fast and

feelings were running high. Currie drew a penalty for roughing and just after returning to the ice, Wilson got his second penalty for holding.

The visitors were two men short when Neil drew down a penalty for a high stick. Abbies played five men up with Kelly and McGlashen missing by inches only to have a stubborn Winnipeg team turn back every thrust.

Gross drew a rest with the timers the first minute of the second session and McQuade gave a great exhibition of net minding with the locals short-handed. Monson, Campbell and Malloy were right in only to have the imperturbable "Kick" kick 'em out. The visitors were out-playing the Abbies by a wide margin.

Kelly and McGlashen combined to the goal-mouth for the Abbies first scoring chance of the period but McQuade once again stepped into the breach—Neil went in on top of McQuade only to have his shot smothered by the local custodian. McArthur pumped two hard drives at the Pegs' goalie but to no avail. After breaking up an Abbie rush at his blue line Wilson snared the rubber to pass to Monson in front of the local rear-guard. Monson forced to the side of the net, passed the wafer out to Wilson, the latter making the red light flicker behind McQuade.

Bill Walker paraded through the entire Western team a minute later but the youthful McQuade smothered the shot. Kelly duplicated his teammate's effort about thirty seconds later only to end up the same way.

Two minutes from the start of the final period "Mickey" McGlashen took "Hickey" Nicholson's pass at the visitors' blue line to worm his way through the defence and blast the wafer high into the upper corner of the twine.

Both goalies pulled off remarkable saves and then Jackie Kane picked up a loose puck at the visitors' blue-line to beat the Peg goalie but the cheers turned to groans as the play was called back for an offside.

Beaton and Kelly were through on several occasions but just didn't click while Monson, Campbell and Malloy were giving McQuade several anxious moments.

With the clock pointing at 18 minutes, Shibiicki drove a hard one from the blue line, the puck finding the upper corner of the net for the winning marker.

## Miami May Be Scene Of Heavyweight Title Bout

### Madison Square Garden Officials Much In Favor Of Florida City.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(A.P.)—Along with reports of industrial progress under the NRA comes boxing's infallible contribution to the signs of better times—Madison Square Garden has about decided to promote another winter heavyweight fight in Miami, Fla.

"We would like to go to Miami this winter," said Col John Reed Kilpatrick in guarded tones today. "We are definitely seeking a match."

But Jimmie Johnston, the man in the iron hat who runs boxing for the Garden, is anything but reticent.

"We're receiving fine reports from Florida," he said, getting all worked up and breathless over the prospect "business is much better."

Believe me there's a lot more people getting dough together right now than there was a year ago and I wish I could get my hands on some."

The Garden's plan, gramatically speaking, is to have Primo Carnera defend his heavyweight title late in February against either Jack Sharkey, Don McCorkindale, the South African or King Levinsky in the Miami bowl for Sharkey's \$200,000 effort against Phil Scot in 1930.

Carnera, who defended his title against Paulino Uzcudun in Rome several weeks ago, will return here in January and is under contract with the garden for two matches. Johnston and Kilpatrick still hope that Max Baer now a moving picture actor, will be lured back to the ring for an outdoor match with

Camera here in June.

Although Max Schmeling, German heavyweight who was knocked out by Baer here last June also is scheduled to return from Germany after the Christmas holidays. He has broken off relations with the Garden. Schmeling has a contract for a return engagement with Baer in San Francisco this winter.

With the heavyweight situation at a standstill, Kilpatrick outlined his plans for other divisions in accordance with his promise, made when he succeeded Bill Carey in the Garden presidency of keeping the public informed of the corporations efforts to bring outstanding warriors together.

"We've got the lightweights, middleweights and light heavyweights and light heavyweights under control," he said.

"Tony Canzoneri and Kid Chocolate fight here Nov. 24 then the winner will meet Cleto Locatelli, the Italian champion, and we'll try to match the winner of that one against Barney Ross for the world title, that's a fine lightweight program."

"Vince Dundee, the Middleweight champion, has signed with us and he'll meet the winner of Friday's match between Young Terry and Ben Jaxy, we're trying to pair Maxey Rosenbloom and Lou Brouillard for the light heavyweight title and we intend to match that winner against John Henry Lewis and Tony Shucro before the indoor season ends.

### Shaughnessy Pennant Play-off Plan Meets With Disapproval.

GALVESTON, Tex., Nov. 15.—Minor league baseball magnates today heard William G. Brumham, President of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, assail the "Shag" Shaughnessy pennant play-off plan and "shoestring operators" discussed important player trades and then waited for a report from an executive committee.

St. Louis Cardinals and the Philadelphia National League club were involved in the principal trade; Branch Rickey, Vice-President of the Cards, traded Jimmy Wilson, veteran catcher, to the Phillies for Virgil Davis, ace backstop, and Ed Delker, infielder. No announcement of a cash consideration was made.

Announcement was made that Guy Sturdy, Little Rock manager and fire baseman last year, had been traded to Baltimore for Guy Cantrell, right-handed pitcher formerly with Boston Braves.

It also was announced the Phillies had purchased Henry Prince Oana, Hawaiian outfielder, from the Portland club of the Coast League, for players and an unnamed amount of cash. Portland traded John Monroe, second baseman, to Albany of the International League for Frank Packard, infielder.

"Buzz" Arlett, outfielder, and John Prudhomme, pitcher, went from Baltimore to the Birmingham Club of the Southern Association, in exchange for Woodley Abernathy, outfielder, and Bill Atwood, catcher.

The executive committee retired behind closed doors to consider an appeal from Art Shires, Jim Lindsey, Gordon Slade and Charles Wilson, formerly members of the Columbus Club of the American Association, who were fined and banned from the circuit last summer for allegedly making false reports concerning salaries.

## Moncton Hawks Held To Scoreless Draw By Seagulls

### "Hub" Team Fails To Penetrate Stubborn Defense Thrown Up By U. S. Amateur Champs.

MONCTON, Nov. 15.—The Atlantic City Seagulls, twice United States national amateur champions, held off the thrusts of the Moncton Hawks, Allan Cup champions, and an exhibition game staged before about 1,600 fans here tonight ended in a scoreless draw. The teams did not play overtime.

Heralded as a fast skating, aggressive collection of all-stars, the Seagulls proved a disappointment. A side from a thrust at the start of the game and a few threats when the Hawks had men in the penalty box, they spent the rest of the evening in thwarting the Allan Cup champions with a stubborn six man defence.

The Hawks outped the Gulls but were unable to break down the resistance of a burly, stubborn defence duo and a forward line that threw up an effective line of resistance just outside their blue-line. Miller, Irvine, James, Connolly, McDonald, all raced through for open chances on the Gulls' net at different times, but erratic shooting when in scoring position robbed them of goals.

Early in the first period the Gulls staged their most dangerous thrusts. McKillop fought off the Moncton defence to accept a forward pass from McKinnon and had an open chance on the Hawk goalie but his shot was wide, and a few minutes later the same players banged the puck in a gang attack but Foster staged a sensational save.

The Hawks turned on the steam at this point and James and McManus worked a passing attack right to Hunter's doorstep but he kicked James' shot aside. From then on the Gulls attended strictly to defensive hockey and raided the Moncton end of the rink only when the "breaks" came their way.

In the third period, apparently weary from their journey, the visitors ragged the puck at every opportunity and held it stationary at centre ice waiting for the Hawks to come and get it.

At times the game was rugged and there were flashes of high sticks. Connolly drew a five minute penalty for jabbing Foster, Gull's left winger.

Anderson and Turping proved a sturdy defense and their blocking was par excellence, aided and abetted by a crew of forwards who covered their opposing wingmen like glue.

The Seagulls will leave Moncton tomorrow morning for Halifax where they are scheduled to play their third exhibition game.
