ISLAND CAPTAIN'S EXPERIENCE.—A press despatch from Nome, Alaska, announces the arrival at Teller on Tuesday of the schooner Teddy Bear, commanded by Captain Joe Bernard, formerly of Tignish, P.E.I., now on U.S. survey work. The Teddy Bear was driven from Point Hope, north of Kotzebue Sound, to St. Lawrence Island, opposite Nome, thence to Sledge Island, opposite Nome through Behring Straits to Shimaref Inlet, a distance of 500 miles, before the storm subsided enough for the vessel to proceed on her regular course. Capt. Bernard was on deck most of the time during the 11 days' fight, and only his seamanship and knowledge of the Northern waters enabled the little schooner to win through, according to the passengers. The schooner Kawaka, for which fears were felt during the storm is reported safe at Keewalk.

SURVEY STEAMER HERE.—The Canadian Government survey steamer Bayfield, loaded with bunker coal and supplies here Saturday. The steamer is on hydrographic survey work around the Magdalen Islands. Captain Backhand is in charge of the work, the chief officer, Capt. McDonald, being an Islander.

A "RUM" GO.—A car containing a party of four, conveying four ten-gallon kegs of rum from Malpeque on route to Charlottetown, last week, met with a disaster outside of Kensington, when the car broke down. A motor expert had to be procured from Kensington, and it was necessary to hide the kegs in a nearby thicket. This operation was noticed by other people, and a constable was phoned for, who succeeded in locating two of the kegs. The smugglers meanwhile got their car under way and escaped in an easterly direction. The captured liquor, which is said to be part of a consignment landed from a smuggler at Malpeque, has been forwarded to Summerside.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The crudeness of a passport photograph caused an amusing scene after a marriage in a London register office recently.  
It is the custom of many prospective brides and bridegrooms who intend spending their honeymoon aboard and wish to leave directly after the ceremony to have their passports sent direct from the passport office to the register office where they are to be married. The register is urged to make sure of the identity of the people named by comparing the passport photographs with the faces before him.

The licence for the marriage referred to had been obtained by the bridegroom, and the first time the registrar saw the bride was when she arrived to be married. The marriage over, the bridegroom asked if his passport had arrived. It had, but while holding out his hand for it he was surprised to see the registrar intently studying the photograph of the bride.  
"This does not look in the least like the bride," said the registrar. The bridegroom failed to convince him but the difficulty was overcome when the bride's friend whispered something into the registrar's ear. Smiling, the registrar handed over the passport to the bridegroom and wished them good luck. A taxicab was summoned, and the party just managed to catch the Continental boat train.
