

HIS FORMER GLORY HAS DEPARTED

William J. Bryan Unnoticed in the Convention—Parker Sure of Nomination—Cleveland's Name Greeted With Enthusiasm.

St. Louis, July 6.—The Democratic National Convention met today and listened to an extended speech from representative John Sharp Williams, in behalf of the temporary chairman, appointed the committees necessary to perfect a permanent organization and adjourned. In a session lasting two hours and fifty minutes, one striking incident overshadowed all other proceedings. That was the enthusiastic and prolonged cheering which greeted the name of the former democratic president, before its last syllable had fallen from the lips of the temporary chairman, was noteworthy in itself; it was magnified by contrast with the greetings accorded the actual persons who stood for all that has been opposed to Mr. Cleveland within the party during the last eight years.

James K. Jones of Arkansas, chairman of the national committee, went on to the platform and took his seat unnoticed. Practically no greeting was given when he faced the convention with gavel in hand.

There were other stalwart lieutenants of the Nebraska man who entered the hall unacclaimed, and lastly Mr. Bryan himself, who, for the first time during two national campaigns, was greeted with silence. Eight minutes after the gavel fell the twice named candidate of his party passed in the main entrance and sought his seat unheralded and unheeded. A few moments later he arose and pushed his way to a seat nearer the aisle, where standing a moment to give greetings to friends, he was caught sight of and applauded. But the measure of applause was but a ripple when compared to the storm called forth by Cleveland's name.

Listening attentively to the democratic doctrine laid down by Mr. Williams, the conservatives found occasion for the first demonstration when reference was made to the record of former President

Cleveland. All the shackled party interest which had lain dormant through two national campaigns was released as by the touch of a trigger.

The name of Cleveland was echoed from a thousand throats. Hats, handkerchiefs, fans and arms were waved, delegates and spectators stood on their chairs and the last semblance of order was turned into confusion which convention officials were powerless to subdue.

While the outburst was at its height Mr. Bryan's following attempted to convert the demonstration into applause for their leader. The name of Bryan was yelled lustily, but in vain. Shouting of "Grover" and "Cleveland" was renewed and the Bryan following was hissed. The greatest significance was attached to the showing made by the conservatives. Their absolute control of the convention is no longer doubt even by those who have heretofore declined to be convinced. The nomination of Judge Parker for president is assured beyond any possibility of defeat.

Exactly on the hour of noon Chairman Jones called the convention to order. The call was read and prayer delivered. A committee was named to escort Mr. Williams to the platform to assume the temporary chairmanship.

With the exception of the tender ignited by the mention of Cleveland's name, the speech of the temporary chairman was received practically without interruption.

As the preliminary business of naming working committees was completed the delegates started to leave the hall. Announcement of the meeting places of the committees on resolutions, credentials, permanent organization and others was made, and at 2.50 the convention adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

On motion, the invitation of the Montague Church to hold the next Association with them was accepted. The report of Systematic Benevolence was discussed by A. W. Schurman, A. W. Sterns, J. J. Robinson, Rev. M. W. Brown, Rev. P. McKillop, Rev. H. G. Corey and adopted. Wm. McVeau read a very interesting historical sketch of the East Point Church. It was endorsed by the Association and ordered to be sent to the Messenger and Visitor for publication.

The afternoon was given to the Women's Mission Aid Society. At this meeting reports were read from the different societies and addresses given by Revs. H. F. Adams, H. G. Corey and M. W. Brown.

At the evening service Rev. P. McKillop preached a clear and striking sermon on the Resurrection. Rev. M. W. Brown led an evangelistic service in which several spoke for the first time. A vote of thanks was passed to the East Point Church and friends, spoken to by Dr. Keirstead, Rev. H. F. Adams, and presented by Moderator Belyea with strong expressions of praise to the friends of East Point for their great kindness.

The weather was cool and delightful and all the visitors were unanimous in their expressions of pleasure and satisfaction with their visit to East Point. The Association has been one of the best ever held by the Baptists in the province.

CHEESE BOARD.

The regular meeting of the Cheese Board was held yesterday afternoon. The following officers were elected: Pres., Lauchlin McDonald; Vice Pres., Charles Waye, East Point; Secy, Robert Jenkins, Mount Albion; Auditor, John Anderson, Kensington.

The cheese boarded was as follows:—
Red Point 50, Lauchlin 112, St. Peters 73, Orwell 125, Stanley Bridge 169, Red House 73, New Perth 175, Hazelbrook, 22, Union 100, Corwall 96, Kensington 250, Dundas 150, Gowan Brae 83, Kinkora 120.

The buyers present were R. E. Spillett, A. J. Biffin, E. T. Higgs for Horace Hazard, J. A. Messervey of Carvell Bros and J. M. Wiley of the Dominion Packing Company.

The quotations received by the Board were:—
"Montreal, weak and declining. London weak and dull, Brockville 7 1/2 to 7 3/4." The best bid offered was by J. A. Messervey of 7 1/2. He secured Orwell and Stanley Bridge.

Mr. Spillett took Lakeville, New Perth, St. Peters, Gowan Brae, Dundas, Red Point, Red House and East River at the same price. This closed the sales on the Board.

On motion the rules of last year were adopted, Mr. Brown of New Glasgow, Mr. McNeill, West River and several others arguing in favor of selling cheese at the weight marked on the box instead of making a deduction for shrinkage.

It was pointed out that the cheese should never show short weight on the other side of the Atlantic in order to preserve our reputation and the buyers said the adoption of the new rule would mean lower quotations.

The meetings during the season will be held on the first Fridays after the 1st and 15th of each month.
