OLDEST METHODIST CHURCH IN ST. JOHN

ST. JOHN, Dec. 12.—On Christmas Day, 1908, the dedication of the first Church in this city, known as the Germain St. Methodist, took place. The church stood on the north-east corner of Germain and Horsfield streets. After the fire of 1877 the location was changed to Queen Square where the present church now stands. The first service was held on Christmas Day, 1808, and was presided over by the Rev. J. Priestly, Rector. The 100th anniversary of this church's birth is being made a special occasion. Preparations are being made to commemorate this event by a united service of all the Methodist churches in the city to be held in Queen Square church, service beginning at 7.30 p. m. Rev. Dr. Stewart of Sackville, senior pastor of the church, will preach the anniversary sermon. Special music will be arranged by the choirs of the different churches in the city. A collection will be taken at this service to aid in the repairs of the church.

During the one hundred years of its existence the church has had thirty pastors, eight of whom have served a second time. These eight are Rev. Messrs. Mansden, Wm. Bennett, Steven Bennett, J. Priestly, Robt. Alder, R. Williams, Job Shenton, and Dr. Sprague. Only seven of the ex-pastors are living. There are Revs. Dr. Steward, Dr. Sprague, Hon. Chappelle of Japan, E. B. Cowperthwaite, St. Johns, Nfld., Thos. Marshall, R. W. Weddall and G. M. Campbell with the exception of those in Japan and New-church, all the surviving ex-pastors will be present at the anniversary service.

PRINCESS OF WALES' SPLENDID TRIBUTE

LONDON, Dec. 12.—The following complimentary article appears in "Canada" one of England's most influential magazines in which is published news of importance to Canadians:—

"The Princess of Wales, in driving to and from the Guild Hall, on the occasion of the visit to the city of London of the King and Queen of Sweden, wore the fur coat presented to her Royal Highness by the women of Nova Scotia. The coat is made of the very finest mink, all trapped in Canada, and is more than three-quarters in length, the collar being formed of three complete skins, small and soft as saffron. The cuffs are similarly made and there is a double row of gold buttons, on which the Prince of Wales' plume is raised in Canadian gems of different colors. The garment is thus comprised entirely of materials found in the Dominion, including the gold."

That a garment, the entire product of Nova Scotia, should be so highly appreciated by its distinguished recipient the future queen as to be used on so notable an occasion, is the highest tribute to Canadian advancement in manufactures that has ever been paid to the Dominion.

FOG IS BRITAIN'S GREATEST FOE

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—The Herald's London correspondent, cables: Lord Roberts' speech on the possibility of invasion has revived interest in a serious subject which people were beginning to forget, and the flame has been fanned by the sensational speech made by Admiral Finnis, who, speaking at Dover, expressed the opinion that an invasion of England would be quite possible. He explained that by "invasion" he meant "raid," and as an instance of how practicable it would be to land a large number of troops on the English coast he said that during the recent manoeuvres he as admiral of the so-called German fleet succeeded in conveying a force supposed to represent seventy thousand troops to the Scottish coast, thanks to a fog which covered the North Sea at the time.

Admiral Finnis urged that in view of this possibility it was necessary to have a powerful army, and here he touched on a subject which has set people thinking about conscription, a word which hitherto has been an anathema to the Britisher.

His opinion was that it would be a good thing for the young men of this country from eighteen to twenty five years old to go for two years into military service.

PRINCESS SELLS DIAMOND TIARA

BERLIN, December 11.—The crown princess has sold below its cost a diamond tiara, estimated to be worth \$25,000, and has added the money to the fund for the benefit of the widows and orphans of those who perished at the recent mining disaster at Hamm, to which the crown princess had previously donated \$1,250. Many members of the court circle have been scandalized by one of the imperial family selling her jewels to raise money, but popular opinion enthusiastically applauds the generosity of the princess.

DOMINION COAL COMPANY WILL RELIEVE DISTRESS.

GLACE BAY, December 11.—A committee from the town council will wait upon the Dominion Coal company, to ask the latter to look after during the winter months, those employees who, owing to lackness of work in the mines, are unable to support their families, and are in want. It is understood that the coal people will agree to care for all their workmen, who, through no fault of their own, are unable to make a living wage during the winter months, and will thus relieve the town of a large expenditure of money for poor relief, which would not be necessary had the coal company acted differently toward their help.

HALIFAX WOMAN BADLY BURNED.

HALIFAX, Dec. 12.—Last evening Miss Sarah Bremner of Lunenburg, aged ninety, was lighting a fire in the stove and her clothes ignited. Her steps, her dress, her hair, and her face were scorched, and she succeeded in putting out the fire.

She was frightfully burned about the legs and body, and died later.

KING EDWARD'S COLD AND RHEUMATISM HANG ON.

LONDON, December 11.—King Edward has had some difficulty in ridding himself of his cold and touch of rheumatism. He had to keep in the house at Sandringham all last week, and his visit to Lord and Lady Ichester this week has been abandoned.

Yesterday he came to London with the Queen and intends to go soon to a resort on the south coast, where the weather is milder, to recuperate.

He will go to Brighton to-day, where he will be the guest of Arthur Sassoon.

BOGUS BILLS OF BANK OF MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—Counterfeit \$5 bills, purporting to be of the Bank of Montreal, are in circulation in the city. One was detected the other day at the Banque Provinciale. It was presented by a butcher who was unable to trace its source. Monday another was detected in the Bank of Montreal. Still another counterfeit turned up yesterday at the Montreal Clearing House.

The bogus bills are skillfully engraved. The numbering, however, is in black, whereas all genuine bills of the issue, January 2, 1904, are numbered in red. The alignment of the numbering is also irregular. The figures showing the denomination are rather bulky and the vignettes of Sir Edward Clouston and Sir George Drummond are a little off. The coloring of the bank is defective and the quality of paper is inferior to the genuine.

The matter has been reported to the Dominion Police at Ottawa.

SPLENDID IDEA NOW ON FOOT

LONDON, Dec. 12.—At an influential meeting at the Mansion House, Lord Mayor Truscott supported a movement in favor of State owned cables, with cheaper rates.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux claimed the cause of cheaper communication between the Mother Country and the Colonies never received such an influential support as now.

Mr. Lemieux was particularly concerned with a State-owned cable service across the Atlantic. This would be of incalculable importance. It was a feasible scheme and one that could be worked on a paying basis, and figures show that the Pacific cable had not been worked at an annual loss. There had been an excess of earnings over expenditure, ranging from \$125,000 to \$278,000 a year, which was regularly employed paying of original capital expenditure. Great Britain and the premier Colonies should lead in the matter of a State-owned cable across the Atlantic. This would immediately lower the charges by fifty per cent., and there would eventually be a charge not exceeding ten cents per word. It would immediately bring down the charges of messages between England and New Zealand and Australia to less than half the present exorbitant rates.

It would be a harbinger of a Pan-Britannic cable and telegraph system that would encircle the globe.
