Reaction to New Herbert Hoover Stork Derby Will Give Food Report

By Allan Nickleson TORONTO, March 13 (CP)—An Irish scrubwoman said "Sure, and he must be happy in heaven, and in some form or another that feeling prevailed today towards "Honest Tom" Foster, a meagre-millionaire who left the bulk of a \$1,500,000 fortune to betterment of mankind.

The will of the 59-year-old former Toronto mayor and landowner who rose from a country butcher boy discouraged criticism. It stipulated that any beneficiary attacking or calling into question its validity, would forfeit any gifts provided. In many cases, beneficiaries have yet to be determined.

The 16 provisions of the unique testament that gave thousands towards education and research to various branches, offered awards totalling \$10,000 for four "stork derbies" and gave large sums to churches and charities for such things as conservation of bird life and children's picnics.

There was, for instance, \$3,000 bequeathed to charities in downtown Toronto buildings, who will be chosen by the Red Cross.

Government to Take \$100,000 The Dominion Government will take approximately \$100,000 in succession duties. The Ontario Government's share will be "practically nothing," the executive said, because Ontario has a charitable, religious and educational bequests.

Provincial Government officials would not forecast whether the \$10,000 left to winners of four separate "stork derbies" would be considered under a charity clause. The residue of the estate—likely to exceed \$600,000—for cancer research, and other grants for scholarships, church missions and hospital patients, will not be taxed.

Of the \$10,000 fund set aside for a Toronto stork derby, the interest will provide \$2,500 at the end of each of four separate 10-year periods. The first of the race periods is under way. It started on the date of death—last Dec. 11.

The winner of each of the four races will receive \$250, with second prizes of \$800 and third awards of \$450.

The baby derby has its first announced entry today when Mrs. Lillian Kenny, who won some \$12,000 in the Millar stork derby for much higher stakes two decades ago, said she was an entrant "but not for the money."

"I'm still young," said the 41-year-old buxom woman. "And I'm expecting another child soon." Mrs. Kenny said she has borne 13 children of whom six are living.

Sense of Humor? TORONTO, March 13 (CP)—Late Thomas Foster was never renowned for his sense of humor while alive but one clause, in his will admitted for probate today, is causing chuckles in church circles. Among numerous other bequests, the former Toronto mayor left \$50,000 for construction of a United Church mission in Northern Ontario. But the location of the mission is to be decided by an Anglican and a Presbyterian.
