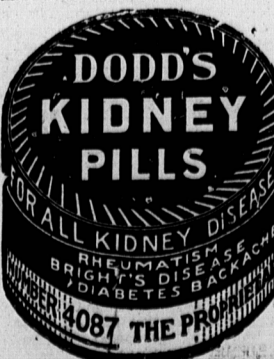

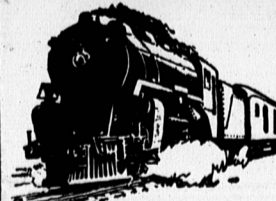

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Current Comment

After a prolonged Rip Van Winkle slumber the Patriot has reached a kind of restored animation, showing sufficient life and courage to touch those treacherous Provincial Accounts. In Monday's issue it ventured to talk Public Accounts Committee, with the feigned opinion expressed that because no minority report was moved, the Opposition were satisfied that the accounts were correct and that the government had a genuine surplus of \$3,200.

Had the Patriot sense enough to notice in the first instance, that the report WAS NOT SIGNED BY ANY OF THE OPPOSITION MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE it would certainly have had sufficient horse sense to the

reason why, and with the fact before it that the Hon. A. E. Arsenault was one of the members of that committee, WHO REFUSED TO SIGN THE MAJORITY REPORT, at this late date it blatantly tells its readers that the Opposition were not only "satisfied" with the report, but also "satisfied" that the Bell Government had a surplus of over three thousand dollars. In real fact, even this majority report did not take the risk of declaring that there was such a bona fide surplus, but contented itself with quoting the cooked up portion of the Accounts as furnished to the House, from which it jumbled up this imaginary surplus. These figures being only such as were in that portion of the Public Accounts which the aggregation permitted to be published, they were no more to be relied on than the blue book itself, and on that no sane man would place the slightest dependence, in the matter of reaching a definite and correct conclusion.

But when the Patriot says that the Opposition presented no counter report nor moved any resolution, it was surely still in a half somnolent condition, or else exceedingly defective in memory. If it will just freshen itself up only a little, and look into the Journals of the House of April 15th, it will discover that a very comprehensive resolution was moved, in amendment to the motion for supply, going extensively into the finances of the country, and laying the finances of the province before the people in detail and in so accurate a form that neither the Patriot, nor the government, or any
