tics. Nevertheless this campaign is helping greatly the Conservative cause in the French Canadian province, as there are numerous groups of men scattered all over the province who are condemning misrepresentations of this nature. There is no doubt that the Conservatives will stage a hard fight to gain power.

There is every probability that Mr. Meighen and his followers will get into office without another general election. They should be able to hold the Maritime rights group as well as the Conservative gains in Manitoba.

The feud between the Liberals and Progressives in Manitoba will no doubt be kept alive. In the last election the Liberals were more bent on punishing the Progressives than beating the Conservatives. The origin of this feud dates back to the elections of 1921. At that time the Liberal candidates were left out of the field in favor of the Progressives and worked for the Progressives in the belief that the Progressives would reciprocate in the Provincial Elections. But such was not the case. When the provincial elections came on Progressive candidates were nominated without regard for Liberal expectations and the United Farmers under John Bracken displaced the Liberal administration of Premier Norris. Therefore the Conservatives are anticipating a discussion between Progressives and Liberals on certain political issues which will bring them back to office automatically.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—Political activity in the capital may take on a renewal of life toward the end of the week. The members of the cabinet are commencing to put in an appearance and a council meeting will be held tomorrow. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, has returned from Atlantic City and others including Hon. Charles Murphy, Postmaster General, are expected back tomorrow.

The Prime Minister has remained at his residence Laurier House throughout the week and so far no statement has been forthcoming regarding his visit to Toronto where he is supposed to have discussed the question of Progressive support with Western leaders including J. W. Defoe, editor of the Winnipeg Free Press. The council tomorrow will probably determine upon putting Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux up for speaker of the House of Commons. It is believed, however, that there is a possibility of Mr. Lemieux being appointed High Commissioner to France. This would necessitate the election of another speaker and would create a vacancy for the constituency of Gaspé.

of the available freight for December loading had been engaged and that rates to some points in the United Kingdom were now 3d. per quarter higher, and also that some vessels for full cargoes had been chartered. A feature of the local grain market was the increased demand of domestic and country buyers for American corn and a fairly large business was done for prompt and future shipments from Chicago. There was a fair demand for oats and the undertone to the market was stronger with Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white quoted at 53 cents, No. 3 white 51½ and No. 4 white at 49½ cents per bushel ex track. Canadian Western grades were fractionally higher. Ontario malting barley changed hands at 85½ cents per bushel ex track. A stronger feeling developed in the spring wheat flour market and prices were advanced ten cents per bushel. This was attributed to the strength in the Canadian cash wheat situation. The winter wheat flour market was quiet and firm. The undertone to the mill-feed market was strong and the volume of business was fair. Prices and it was reported that the bulk

able opponent because of his fearlessness and skill, but he played fair.

Richthofen's end was no less spectacular than his career. He had been battling a British plane near Fricourt, in the Somme and the latter toward home. The British plane was in difficulties and the Baron was "on its tail"—above and behind the other pilot, the strategic point sought in these aerial duels as they reached the British lines. They were flying only a few hundred feet up. It was a typical Richthofen stunt of daring and foot-hardiness. English riflemen and machine guns opened up on him, and before he could get away his red-winged plane crashed, just in front of the lines.

German aerial observers flashed back word to the British and the German gunners clamped a barrage about the plane in an effort to prevent the British from getting to it, but without avail.

When the machine was dragged in the British found Richthofen dead, strapped in his seat underneath his aviator's suit he wore blue silk pajamas. His body was treated with the greatest reverence, a special lead coffin was procured and for a time he lay almost in State in a tent near the fighting lines, with a guard of soldiers. A sentry stood over the fallen plane.

He was buried in the Fricourt Cemetery with fullest military honors, while a great fleet of Allied planes circled overhead. Distinguished French, British and Belgian officers came long distances to do him honor and the last rites were among the most impressive seen along the front during the war.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 19.—All the large receiving centers in Canada prices are steadily advancing on the higher grades. United States markets are higher for fresh eggs and lower for refrigerators. According to latest cables received the British market is reported firmer and 41 cents f.o.b. seaboard is quoted for firsts. Toronto jobbing specials 70, fresh extras 66, storage 45, fresh extras 55, storage 42, seconds 36.

Montreal undertone is very firm with a steady demand for supplies and offerings are barely sufficient to meet the requirements. Storage extras quoted 46, firsts 42, seconds 37.

Winnipeg markets very quiet prices unchanged. Saskatchewan dealers are quoting country shippers, delivered cases returned, extra 44, firsts 42, seconds 25. Alberta and British Columbia market conditions remain unchanged.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 19.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was inactive, exporters in most cases stating that few firm bids were received from foreign houses for any line of grain. On the other hand there continues to be a steady demand from the Canadian pool and United States exporters for ocean grain from West St. John and it was reported that the bulk
