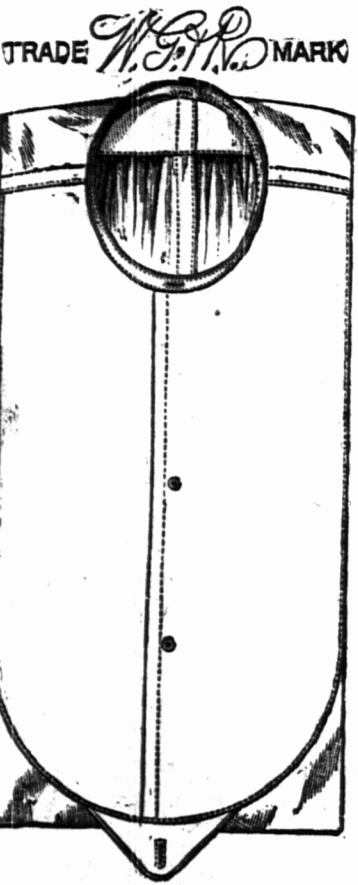

LOCAL BRIEFS

THE HALIFAX HERALD says: Rev. W. Townsend of Bass River is visiting his home at Traveller's Rest, P. E. I.

CHARLOTTETOWN ENGINEERS will parade at Drill shed at 1 o'clock today to form Guard of Honor at closing of the Provincial Legislature.

THE EASTERN CHRONICLE of May 18. says: Mrs. George A. Dixon, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. was visiting friends in New Glasgow this week.

THE ELFIN.—The statement in the column regarding the inspection of this steamer in yesterday's GUARDIAN may have given an impression stronger than the facts would warrant. As a matter of fact the Elfin's boiler passed a satisfactory examination and the reduction in pressure is only one pound, or from 35 pounds to 34. The official test should give the public confidence in the steamer.

Last night at nine o'clock a train of nine cars left the station loaded with cattle for Alberton, N. W. T. shipped by Mr. Hartz for his ranch at that place. There are some fifty or sixty more to meet them at Summerside. Mr. Ward and Harry Gates, from Mr. Hartz's farm and Lea Davison late in the employ of the Telephone Co. went to take charge of the cattle. Mr. Barret Henderson went as far as Summerside. Mr. Henderson is going to follow next month.

MISS LEFURGEY'S musical and literary recital drew to the Kindergarten Hall last evening a large and fashionable audience. There were many auxiliary attractions,—the well-dressed crowd, the platform decorated with plants and ferns, and an array of the best instrumental and vocal musical talent in the city. The musical numbers of the programme included piano solos by Prof. Watts, corset solos by Miss Gwendoline Welsh, vocal solos by Miss Ceilings and Miss Amy Earle, all of which were excellent. A reading by little Hazel Hughes was admirably given, and like the musical numbers before and after was heartily applauded. Miss Welsh was the recipient of two handsome bouquets. The principal attraction, especially for those not of fully developed musical tastes, was Miss Lefurgey's dramatic recitals. Her subjects included the Going of the White Swan, from Gilbert Parker; the third scene in the Merchant of Venice; Mulholland's Contract with God, the Future and the Re-cessional; from Kipling; The Schoolmas or Beaten; from Nicholas Nickleby by Dickens; The last Wailz and Othello's Defence from Shakespeare. These selections, as will be readily seen, embrace a great variety and collectively they form a "considerable test of an elocutionist's power of interpretation. Miss Lefurgey certainly did not fail in any one of her selections, and succeeded in pleasing her audience in all, though not equally. The scene from the Merchant of Venice was a good piece of work; she was perhaps most moving in her solemn and artistic rendition of the Re-cessional, and if her recital of Othello's defence was somewhat lacking in energy and spirit it was pleasing withal. All regretted that the scene from Hamlet, which was mentioned on the programme was necessarily omitted owing to Miss Lefurgey's slight hoarseness. The entertainment was heartily enjoyed by all from the beginning down to the National Anthem at the close.

Arbor Day in City Schools.

PRINCE STREET.
Today will be Arbor Day in the City Schools.

The following order of exercises will be observed: Recitations, Essays, songs and addresses will be conducted in the class rooms at 10 o'clock a. m., after which each class will plant a tree.

Among those who have consented to be present and deliver addresses are His Worship Mayor Warburton, Rev. G. P. Raymond and His Honor Judge Fitzgerald.

QUEEN SQUARE.

The pupils of Queen Square School will meet in their respective class rooms at 9 a. m. One hour will be spent in exercises appropriate to the occasion. About 10 o'clock the pupils will have fire and military drill, after which the school grounds will receive attention. Trees will be planted under the care of each of the two new rooms formed since last year.

WEST KENT.

At West Kent the scholars will be massed in the large hall at 10 o'clock and a programme appropriate to the day will be carried out and addresses delivered by Rev. G. M. Campbell, Rev. D. B. McLeod and Principal Miller of the Charlottetown Business College. Then a tree will be planted by each room.

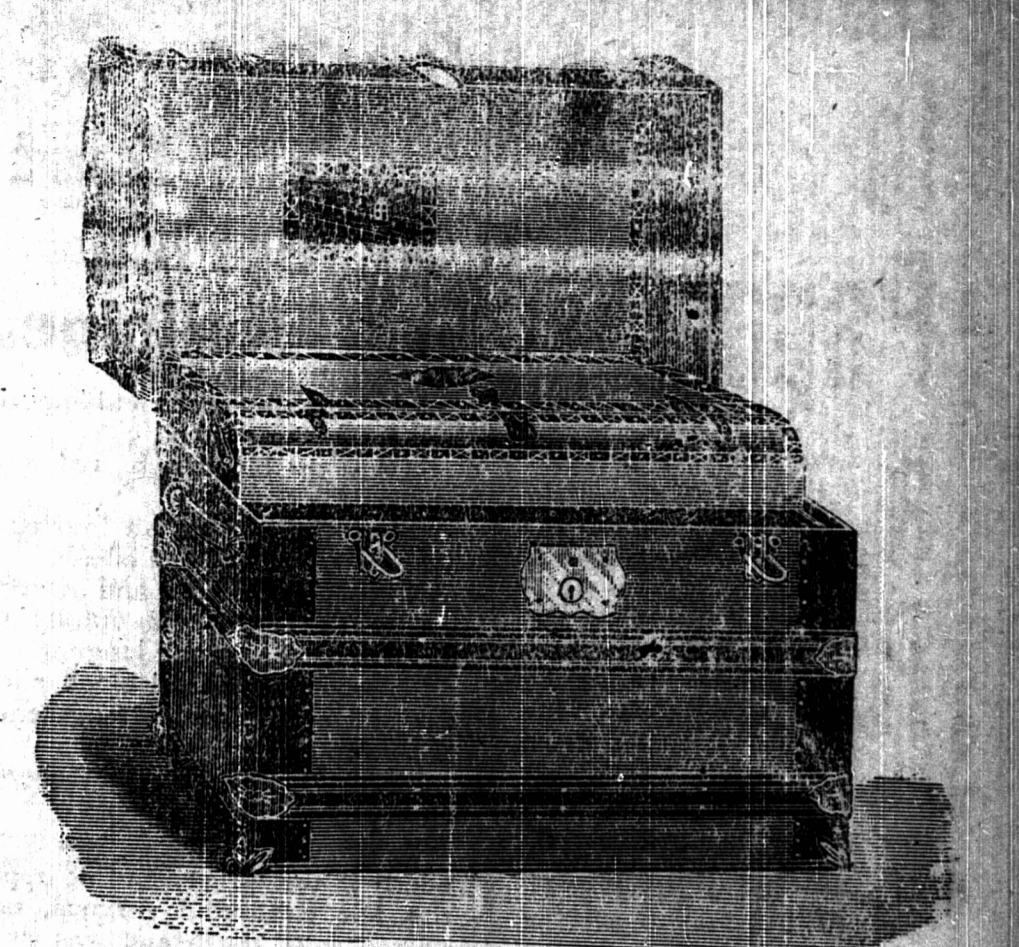

Georgetown at 12.30 p. m. and arrives at Charlottetown 3.30 p. m. Express leaves Souris at 6.10 a. m. and Georgetown at 6.40 a. m. arriving at Charlottetown at 9 a. m. The Accommodation train leaves Charlottetown at 2 p. m. arrives at Souris at 6.10 p. m. and Georgetown at 5.05 p. m. All at Eastern Standard Time. No change in the time of the departure and arrival of accommodation train in and out of Tignish and Summerside in the mornings, and Charlottetown to Summerside in the afternoon. 18 41 d
