LESS SPEED FOR DEFENCE—Most of the 48 United States have planned a reduction in speed program in connection with the nation's tire rationing.

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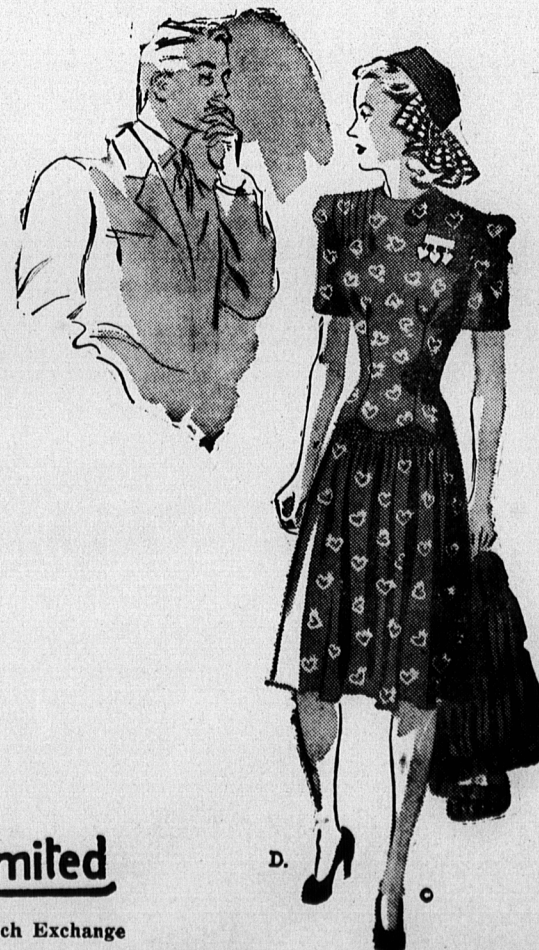
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Kings Co. L. O. L.

Detectives jailed On perjury counts

TORONTO, Feb. 8—(CP)—Alan Winans and William Waddowson, private detectives, were sentenced to penitentiary terms Friday following conviction by an assize court jury on charges of giving perjured evidence in divorce proceedings instituted by Mrs. Helen Hershaw against Ogdin Hershaw. Mr. Justice A. W. Green sentenced Winans to five years in penitentiary and Waddowson to three years. The accused testified in the divorce hearing that they discovered Hershaw living with a woman named Grace Nichols at a Montreal address. Hershaw said he did not even know anyone of that name and had been living in Montreal alone at the time. The owner of the Montreal boarding house testified Hershaw had lived alone. Mr. Justice A. W. Green asked in his address to the jury what "possible motive could there be for Hershaw to risk his own liberty by coming here to commit the same crime these men are accused of."
