

C.P.R. HAS SECURED QUEBEC CENTRAL

SHERBROOKE, Que., July 6.—The purchase or lease of the Quebec Central Railroad by the C. P. R. and New York, New Haven and Hartford may have an important bearing upon a cross continent transportation.

The C. P. R. has long been credited with the desire to obtain an outlet to a New England port. A short link joined the Rimford Falls line with the Megantic branch of the Quebec Central at Lake Megantic is already surveyed, with the C. P. R. as part owners of the Q. C. R. and the Rimford Falls link constructed by the Canadian Pacific would have a direct line from Quebec to Portland, Maine, or some other port in the vicinity, which it might develop. This is the opinion of local railway men, as a possible outcome of the C. P. R. deal.

REPORTS ON THE KILLING OF FOUR

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 6.—The steamer from Dussata yesterday brought the preliminary report of Consul Frederik Simpsich in reference to the killing of Americans at Atlatlamo by Mexican Federals. The report is a voluminous one, and has been forwarded to the State Department at Washington. Its contents are unknown. In addition to the four white men reported killed, there were several Americans present at the time of the killing. They are thought to have made their escape. Of the four men killed, one was a Canadian, another was a Frenchman.

CHILE ORDERS MORE DRADNOUGHTS

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 6.—It is stated here that an American firm, with a view to securing the contract for the construction of the two Dreadnoughts for Chile, has offered to deduct \$1,000,000 from his original tender price. According to a London despatch, the English tenders for the construction of the two Chilean Dreadnoughts have been accepted. One of the English tenders is \$1,900,000 below the next lowest bid.

ASKS REDRESS AND GETS IT

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 6.—The captain of the British steamer 'Public' came today and asked the Government's aid in seeking redress from the Washington authorities for the detention of his vessel recently at Key West on the charge of carrying more passengers than the number permitted in the ship's register. A fine was imposed by the Key West officials and the vessel detained until a bond was given for settlement. Representations by the Jamaican Government resulted in the remission of the fine. The complaint of the shipper will now go to the British Ambassador.

CAMP WILL BREAK UP TO-DAY

The annual camp of the P. E. I. Militia will break up today. Last evening a concert was given at the grounds in which a number of local talent assisted. At the Light Horse grounds yesterday afternoon, just preceding stable parade the troopers caught and bounded their troop leaders, giving three cheers for each. Sgt. Instructor Dee arrived on the scene to see what the commotion was all about, but his height did not save him for the bounce and three cheers were handed out to him. Sgt. Major Bell was shown that he also was popular among the troopers. As the Major and Lieut. Stewart passed three cheers and a tiger were given for each. The Light Horse must certainly have popular officers and non-commissioned officers when such a friendly feeling is shown towards them on the eve of breaking camp.

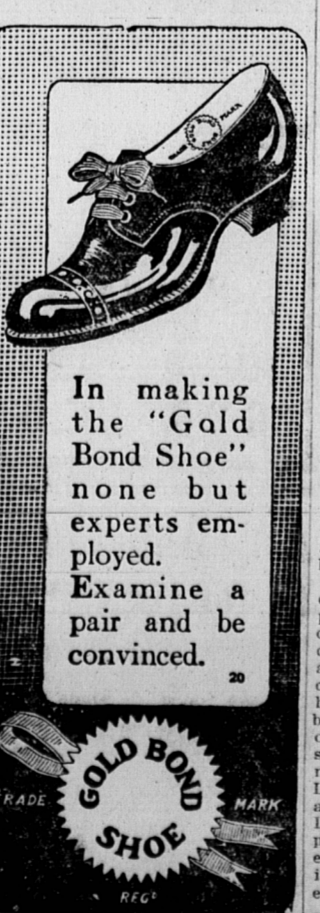
