LEAFS, AMERKS, REDWINGS WIN TILTS

Detroit Team Goes On Wild Scoring Spurge To Defeat St. Louis 11-2

TORONTO 4; MONTREAL 2

MONTREAL, Dec. 13—It took them an overtime period to do it, but Toronto Maple Leafs conquered Montreal Maroons 4-2 before an excited crowd of 10,000 here tonight and stretched their margin over Maroons to eight points in the Canadian section standing of the National Hockey League.

The section leading Leafs came from behind in the third period to tie the score at 2-2 and then Charlie Conacher won the game for them in the overtime with a nice goal. Buzz Boll buzzed home another goal just to make sure and it was 4-2.

A capacity crowd oared continuously as the Maroons and Leafs struggled through one of the most exciting games of the season here.

Happy Day slapped in a first period goal on a pass from Heo Klira to give Toronto an early lead. Allan Shields tied it up for Maroons in the second on an assist from Earl Robinson, and then Dave Trotter banged in a goal in the third on an assist from Robinson to give Montreal a lead of one goal. Busher Jackson dashed from behind with another Leafs goal. Joe Primeau and Charlie Conacher contributing assists.

The game was forced into overtime by Busher Jackson's counter, but half way through the extra ten minutes Joe Primeau led a pass to Charlie Conacher's stick and the big left wing sent it whistling into the twine.

Maroons tossed caution to the wind and bored in with a five man attack that had Geo. Hainsworth stepping fast in the Toronto cage. Conacher cleared on a long pass from Thoms, whirled in on Connell with one defenceman to beat and slammed the puck into the back of the cage.

The Montrealers had a slight edge on territorial play but marksmanship around the nets proved costly.

LOTT SIGNS PRO CONTRACT

NEW YORK, Dec. 13—George Martin Lott, Jr. today talked about amateur tennis: Is there such an animal? He asked—and then to the accompaniment of bursting photographic bulbs and with a few swift strokes of a pen signed a professional contract to play under the banner of sports promoter Bill O'Brien.

"Remember that day a few years back when you said 'I'll never be a tennis bum'?"

"Well," said Lott, "I've been sore about you guys for writing that and while I denied it ever said it I'll admit now that I did."

With his amateur past behind him—it was one of the most colorful in modern tennis which saw the 28-year-old Chicago star sweep practically all doubles honors in 1927—Lott officially launched a professional career, which will open in Madison Square Garden, Jan. 19 in the first of 78 separate appearances, each in a different city.

Lott signed a contract calling for 12 1-2 percent of the gross gate receipts and his earnings for the first year are expected to amount to between \$15,000 and \$25,000.

MONARCHS WIN FROM LIONS

Braves Offer To Take Ruth Over From Yanks As Assistant Manager

NEW YORK, Dec. 13—The way to realization of Babe Ruth's dream of managing a major league ball club was smoothed today by Boston Braves as the calmest, quietest major league meetings in many years closed.

The Braves, busily seeking ways and means of overcoming the rising popularity of the rival American League club, the Red Sox, turned straight to the greatest attraction of the opposition league as Charles Adams, Braves stockholder, made the first overtures to Jacob Ruppert, owner of the Yanks.

Briefly, the Braves' idea is to take Ruth as an assistant to their present manager, Bill McKechie, having him hit and play now and then in the city where he started his fabulous major league career with the Red Sox in 1914. Ruppert told Adams that the Braves could have Ruth and play him in pinch roles without a goal. He said he would be nothing, just so the Babe gets his chance as manager as a fitting reward for 20 years of major league play and slugging star-dom. The Braves have no idea of supplanting McKechie, who recently signed a one-year contract.

Hughes Still Uncertain To Come East

WINNIPEG, Dec. 13—William (Billie) Hughes, well known trainer of hockey teams and prominent sportsman, was still undecided tonight whether or not to accept the offer to coach the St. John Beavers of the Maritime Mercantile Hockey League.

Negotiations were still underway with nothing definitely decided.

Ruth Still Attraction

Nothing further will be done regarding Boston's effort to get the Bam back until the Babe returns from his tour of the Orient, where the tremendous crowds that turned out to see him play in Japan re-opened eyes to the magnitude of his mighty drawing powers of the home run king.

The Babe's desire will be considered. The Yanks understand, but have received no official word that Connie Mack, Ruth's manager on Far East tour, would like him as an assistant next year, and that the Red Sox are toying with the idea of asking the Babe as Joe Cronin's assistant.

While the magnates did not discuss the Babe's case officially in the American League meetings Tuesday and Wednesday, it is considered that extra efforts now will be made to keep him in the league.

Squash Racing Scheme

The Braves' overtures for Ruth following the quiet snuffing out of Judge Emil Fuchs' effort to turn the Braves Park over to dog racing during the coming summer evenings. Fuchs applied to the Massachusetts Racing Commission for a license for a dog track, but assured the National League owners at their meetings Tuesday and Wednesday that he would do nothing to embarrass baseball or the National League. The league by-laws forbid betting, a major adjunct to dog racing, in its ball parks. Fuchs may lease Fenway Park, home of the Red Sox, for home games, thus making it possible to use Braves field as a dog track.

Bill Terry, Giants' manager, completed the second trade of the season, a deal whereby Joe Bowman, right hand pitcher, and
