T. Merbury and Company of this City, via the C. P. R. D. S. and railway service.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION STARTS IN HAYTI. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 26. - Captain John Hood, commanding the cruiser Tacoma, now at Guantanamo, has been ordered to proceed with that warship to Aux Cayes, the headquarters of the department of the south where General Simon started a revolution, with a view to keeping this government informed officially of what is occurring in that section. He should reach there in about twenty-four hours.

WEST HAS CAUGHT THE MILITARY SPIRIT. WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 26. - The military spirit is certainly abroad in the West at the present time and almost every town and village is aspiring to have either a foot or cavalry corps. A Highland regiment is being organized in Winnipeg and will be on parade next season.

BULGARIA AND TURKEY REACH AN AGREEMENT. PARIS, Nov. 26. - Official advices received here indicate that Bulgaria and Turkey have practically come to terms in the matter of Bulgaria's declaration of independence, on the following basis: Bulgaria is to pay Turkey from twelve million to fourteen million dollars on account of Rumelia, and ten million dollars on account of the railroad. The capitalization of the Roumelia tribute and the participation of Bulgaria in the Turkish debt is to be left to the international congress.
