Holiday Camps For Unemployed

SHEFFIELD, England, June 5.—(C.P.)—An experiment in holiday camps for unmarried unemployed men is being made at Derwent and Great Hucklow, near Sheffield. All single young men registering at Sheffield employment exchanges will be able to apply for a fortnight's holiday at these camps. The accommodation will be somewhat limited this year, but by next year it is hoped that there will be accommodation for 5,000 men. The scheme is stated to be the first of its kind in the country, and has been planned in connection with the Sheffield social centres for the unemployed, of which there are already about 10, where the men do useful work to lighten their enforced leisure. Unemployed men at the centres are now making trestles, camp beds, tables, and other equipment for the camps.

NEW BRUNSWICK MEN APPOINTED

SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 2.—(C. P.)—Two New Brunswick men now residents of Ottawa, have been appointed to make a hydrographic survey of the Mackenzie river delta for the Department of Marine. Arthur Wightman, a native of Chatham, N. B., and Norman Wilson, formerly of Fredericton, N. B., will start out on their mission from Ottawa on May 26. Both are graduates of the University of New Brunswick.

From Edmonton, Wightman and Wilson will proceed by rail to Fort McMurray, whence an auxiliary schooner will sail to the river mouth. The party expects to reach Aklayik early in July, devoting the rest of that month, August and part of September to the work.

Destruction of two boats in the delta district has led to the belief that it is changing and the Hudson Bay Transport Company is co-operating with the Dominion Government in making the survey.

—FOX PELTS FROM HOLLYWOOD—A second consignment of silver black fox pelts has reached the Prince Edward Island Fur Pool at Summerside from Hollywood, California, to be placed on sale at the fur auctions held in London, England. A change has been made in the method of packing pelts when sending overseas, stated Canadian National Express officials. Plywood is now largely used for the purpose as this guards against the danger of pressing which has a tendency to damage the fur.

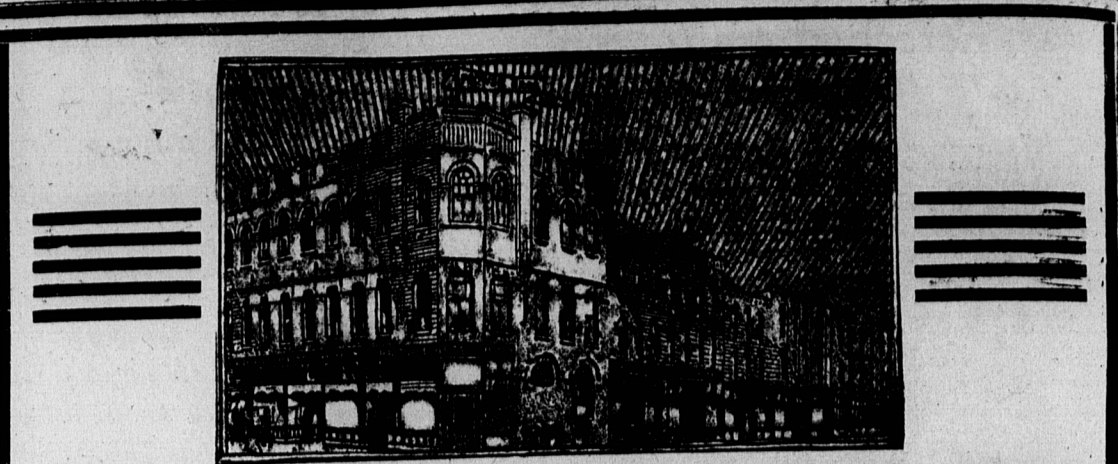
