

FISHING NEAR SYDNEY.

HALIFAX, March 16—Some good catches of herring were made last week at the North Side, Sydney. On Monday and Tuesday the average catch was from 300 to 500 to a net. Until last week there was poor fishing along the North Side shore, and the account not more than a dozen nets were set there when the herring struck in. At the "boom," Sakani, there are upwards of 200 nets set in the ice, but fishing has been slack there during the past week. Several Sydney fish dealers are out there every day, and buy usually the herring just as they are taken from the nets. The prices paid to the owners vary from 80 cents to \$1 per hundred, while in the markets, the herring are sold at 25 or 30 cents a dozen. This would seem to be a profitable business to the fish dealers or middlemen.

On Sunday in the First Methodist Church in Charlottetown Rev. Jacob Heaney, the pastor, announced that the ballots for the vote on Church Union would be distributed to the members of the church and congregation at the service next Sunday evening and also at the morning and evening services of the following Sunday.

A letter from the Colonial Stock Company was received yesterday stating that they would return for their Charlottetown engagement the week of the Queen's Birthday. The letter is dated from the Annapolis Valley and the Colonials are glad to report business universally good. Manager Hopkins says, "It is the best season the company has ever had." As this organization usually closes the week of the Queen's Birthday, Mr. Hopkins decided to make Charlottetown the closing point, thereby giving the members of the company an opportunity of spending a couple of weeks on Prince Edward Island before returning to New York. The company is now booking its route for next season and contracts are being returned giving The Colonials the most choice dates of the year.

The many social problems of today, especially in their relation to the work of the Church, were exhaustively discussed at the meeting of the Montreal Protestant Ministerial Association, which was held in the Central Y. M. C. A. building recently, Rev. Frank J. Day presiding. A committee on Moral and Social Reform was appointed to co-operate with the joint action of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in taking a social survey of the Dominion. Six of the leading cities of the Dominion are being grouped in 3 pairs; Toronto and Montreal forming one, and the work in these two latter cities will be conducted simultaneously under the direction of Miss Carson, an expert from New York. Rev. Dr. J. A. Gordon, formerly of Eldon, now pastor of a Baptist Church in Montreal, was appointed on the committee.

The following despatch from Toronto will interest many in this Province, especially dealers and exporters of potatoes.—Two New Brunswickers came to Toronto recently in control of the potato trust of that Province. Ontario potatoes are apparently a thing of the past, and the easterners felt that they had a market to themselves. The price of the New Brunswick potatoes was raised daily and the commission man was compelled to ask two dollars a bag. Having made a market, and with a good supply on hand, the New Brunswick promoters sent out peddlers through the city and reaped a harvest by disposing of their stock at \$1.30 a bag, and thus cutting the feet from under the commission men. But the commission houses got busy. They imported Irish potatoes, and then went after the English article. By careful computation it was found that English potatoes could be landed and sold in Toronto at \$1.65 a bag, and the corner of the New Brunswickers has been broken. The next episode in the potato business will be watched with more than ordinary interest.
