PERSONAL LIBERTY.

Lord Salisbury is quoted as saying that prohibition is an invasion of personal liberty. Seventy years ago statesmen as eminent as he were defending human slavery in the British parliament. The world looks at many things very differently now from what it did then. Lord Salisbury, as one of the rich British aristocracy, moves in a circle which, with all its advantages in other respects, is under the great disadvantage of being as yet almost untouched by the temperance reform. It is indeed a great disadvantage, because the moral movement of the world in its onward march has left him behind. He reflects the views and opinions of seventy years ago, rather than of the present time. He knows nothing of the benefits of total abstinence, which neither he nor his associates in the aristocracy have tried.

It would be easy to show that a man's natural liberty to do as he pleases is limited to his liberty to do what is right. A man has a natural right to drink intoxicating liquors only in the same sense that he has a right to gamble or to read immoral books. Yet in most British countries, which we think the freest in the world, the law has taken away the right to gamble and has prohibited the importation and sale of immoral books and publications. What is more, if Lord Salisbury had lived in America he would have learned that many communities of those who value their personal liberty as highly as any communities in the world have entirely forbidden the sale of intoxicating drinks. And had he thought of it, even in slow-going England, if there is a natural right to drink in toxicants, that natural right is as strong on Sunday, or at any hour of the night, as on the week day and in the broad light of day. Yet there the law has stepped in to restrict the sale on Sunday and in the late hours of the evening. The natural right is quite as strong on election days as on other days. Why then does British law in Lord Salisbury's own country forbid the sale of ardent spirits on election days?

The argument of natural right thus put forward by the British Premier will not stand for a moment as an argument against prohibition in the light of British law and precedents with which Lord Salisbury is perfectly familiar.

The mingled army worship and fear of army criticism in France shows that the French army is now probably as corrupt and unready for real service to the country as it was in the days of the late empire and the disaster of Sedan. It seems pitiable that any civilized country should be in such a state of mind that even the mildest criticism of the army should be regarded as treason to the state. Such a condition is bad alike for the army and the nation.
