BIG RETURNS AS KASHMARY WINS RACE

Opening Day of Rockingham Park Programme Provides Big Upsets.

SALEM, N. H., July 26—(A.P.)—After falling in her first start, the 106 1-2, Kashmary, Black daughter of the famous Mr. McElwain, made a stirring comeback two races later today to provide the Grand Circuit's opening Rockingham Park programme with its outstanding upset.

Kashmary, with Ben White at the reins, paid her supporters the longest price of \$38 for every \$2 mutual ticket when she beat out the roan mare Calumet Anne by a length in the seventh race, a 2.14 hot. She started against the same field in the fifth but fell in the stretch.

The first of the "big chains" 16 day Salem meet drew an opening crowd of 7,500 which broke all of the year's trotting and pacing records by wagering a total of \$43,913 in the eight separate and distinct races.

Officials discarded the Grand Circuit's time-honored system of heats because it was out of line with New Hampshire's new pari-mutuel law. Calumet Crusader, driven by W. Dickerson, won the day's top heavy favorite. Tickets on this black son of Trux returned only 40 cents for \$2 when he captured the 2.14 trot, in which Kashmary came to grief, in 2.05.

Three Halifaxians went down to defeat in singles matches played today. M. Clennett lost to Leon Shaw of Wolfville, who was later eliminated by William Martell of Windsor. Arthur Merkel was eliminated in the second round by another Windsor player, Robert Dimock, who then went out and took his third round match from R. Murdoch of Halifax.

The team of Dimock and Martell favored to win the boys' doubles, later took an easy victory in straight sets from H. Little and J. Johnston of Halifax, 6-2, 6-1, advancing to the third round. H. Jones and H. Harlow of Truro also went into the third round by virtue of a three set victory over J. Shields and J. McDonald.

The 2.26 Trot and Pace had three starters, the trotters Jollyset and Walkie and the pacer La Rico. Jollyset, owned by C. H. Bennett, Murray River, won in straight heats very much to the surprise of most of the horsemen, who believed that Walkie had too much step for the son of Longset. However, the first heat was very close and in the second Walkie finished ahead of Jollyset, but was set back for making a break. In the third heat Walkie again made a break which destroyed his chances. La Rico finished third in the first and third and was given second place when Walkie was set back in the second heat.

The 2.29 Trot and Pace was a dandy race with four starters. It was expected that Barbara Martin would be an easy winner. True, she won the first heat and was second in the second heat, but the surprise packet was Lady Lee, owned and driven by George McGuigan, St. Mary's Road, who, minus the usual paraphernalia worn by pacers on a race track, is as steady as a clock, winning the second heat in faster time than the first and tripping off the third heat just as the gong would say. 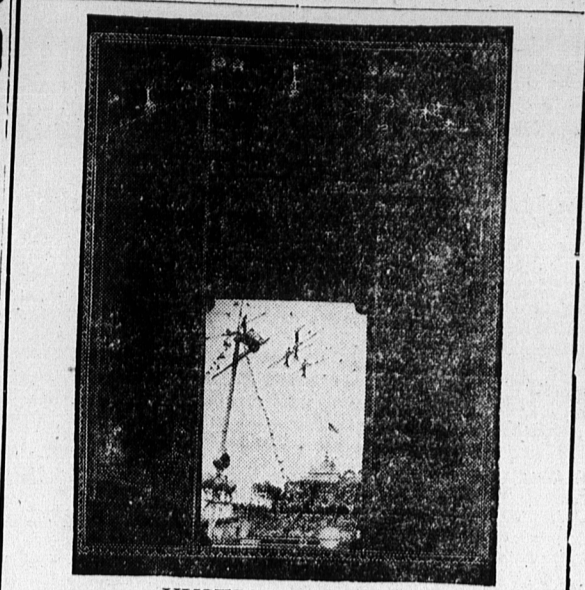

The third fight was between Benny Binns and Stoker Petrie, and went six rounds. Binns was awarded the decision.

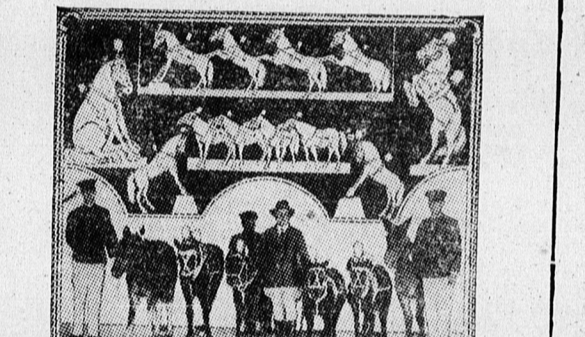
