New York Yankees Streak Reaches 14 Straight Games

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—The New York Yankees rushed on toward the American League championship at Chicago today with a double victory over the White Sox, 8-1 and 1-0, behind the brilliant pitching of Spurgeon Chandler and Charles (Red) Ruffing.

The incredible Joe DiMaggio, Yankee powerhouse, collected three hits in the first game and one in the 11-inning nightcap to run his hitting streak to 33 games to the delight of a sellout crowd of 50,387.

The Bronx Bombers extended their string of consecutive triumphs to 14 games.

At Detroit, Jack Knott, 34-year-old right-hander overcame the handicap of two home runs by Pinky Higgins and turned in a five-hit pitching performance to give Philadelphia Athletics a 5-4 victory over the Tigers.

The Athletics pounded out 11 hits, including four singles by first baseman Dick Siebert, in backing up Knott.

At Cleveland, the Indians, though

Giants and Reds closed a bit of the wide gap between themselves and the first two places in the league Saturday by knocking off Cards and Brooklyn Dodgers respectively.

The first-place Dodgers went down 3-2 before the Reds. The Giants made eight hits good for six runs and a 6-4 decision off the second-place Cards.

Pittsburgh Pirates handed the hapless Philadelphia Phillies another defeat, 6-1 when a big seventh-inning rally won for the Pirates.

Chicago was rained out at Boston.

Cards Cut Brooklyn's Lead To 2 1-2 Games

BROOKLYN, July 13 (AP)—The Dodgers' National League lead was cut to 2 1/2 games today as Philadelphia whipped the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-3, before a crowd of 36,150, a season record for Ebbets Field.

Claude Passeau, who was in the all-star game, and young News Kimball, who should have been in it, were today as good as out of the work, as no indication, were the heroes. Passeau got off to a shaky start, gave up three Dodger runs in the first two innings, then settled down and served shutout ball for the rest of the way for a 10-3 victory in the opener.

Kimball, making his first start of the year, tossed a six-hitter for a 3-1 decision in the afterpiece.

Since the second-place St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Phillies twice, the split chopped a full game off the Dodgers' pennant edge.

At New York, Pittsburgh Pirates ran their winning streak to seven straight by whipping the opener of a doubleheader from the Giants 4-0, but the string was snapped in the nightcap as the New Yorkers posted an 8-2 decision.

Lefty Ken Heintzelman tossed a sparkling two-hitter in the opener for his third straight victory.

In the nightcap, Frankie Frisch used six pitchers, one short of the record, trying to pull the game out but old-timer, Earl Baretz and Hal Schumacher led the New Yorkers home.

At Boston, the Braves and Cincinnati Reds dividing honors, the world champions giving undefeated Elmer Eddy his 10th straight decision, 4-0, before the Braves came back in the last inning of the nightcap to bang out a 6-5 triumph.

At Philadelphia, St. Louis Cardinals picked up a game on the first place Dodgers by taking both ends of a doubleheader from the Phillies, 7-2 and 8-5, while the Dodgers split with Chicago.

Ghezzi beats Nelson for P. G. A. title

CHERRY HILLS, DENVER, July 13 (AP)—Vic Ghezzi, Deal, N.J., won the 24th annual United States Professional Golfers Association Golf Championship by defeating Byron Nelson, Toledo, Ohio, one up, in 38 holes today.

For Nelson, stolid Texan from Toledo, Ohio, it was his second "extra-innings" defeat in the P.G.A. final in three years.

He lost to Henry Picard in a 37-hole fray in 1939 by missing a six-foot putt before conquering Sam Snead in last year's title-deciding tussle.

The end of a long day of dramatic battling between the two 29-year-old veterans was written with wavered putters on the green of the 400-yard second extra hole, perched on the lake edge at rolling Cherry Hills.

Nelson, firing visibly, missed the green with their iron seconds but both chipped valiantly to within 30 inches of the flag. They were so close they flipped a coin to decide which would putt first.

Nelson won and tapped the ball. It slid past the cup by a hair. Ghezzi, Deal, N.J., campaigner who is built like a fullback, then slapped blade against ball and for a second or it looked as though he too had missed, but the ball slithered in from the side for all important par 4.
