Newfoundlanders and how we high-brow them—many times we turn up our noses at citizens of the United States. Jews are not understood in Canada. I added—"How can we expect the countries of Europe to get together if we allow this attitude to grow up between Canada and her nearest neighbours?"

Mrs. Zimmerman also referred to the headlines in newspapers. Editors know what will sell their papers. First, war; second, earthquake, tornado, etc.; third, crime. Much would be accomplished if women, through their organizations, were to form committees on publication, which would check all foreign news from thought of view fact sources, bias and only half truths.

The answers to the seventh question impressed me greatly. It read thus—"Will you pray that the Spirit of the Prince of Peace may dwell in the hearts of men and women everywhere, making war impossible to the world?" The answers were emphatically "Yes" and "We certainly will." I am glad I asked that question, for I realize better than ever before, why our province is so favored. Our people, in a large majority are prayerful and God-fearing. Let us continue to pray that our province may not only be the Garden of the Gulf, but may become a Garden of Eden, and that peace may cover the earth as the waters cover the great deep.

I wish to remind you of the literature on the League of Nations at the Institute Department at Charlottetown, and to urge the use of same. The Carnegie Library, too, can supply you with much information on world conditions.

In closing I want to urge the continued efforts of all Institute members in furthering, and if possible perfecting the ideals and principles of the League of Nations.

Legislation. The following report on legislation was prepared by Mrs. John McHugh, Convenor.

Madam President, Officers and Members of the Women's Institute. If we could but realize it, the subject of Legislation is most vital, as it is through legislation that public opinion is consolidated and made effective, so I am sorry that not all of you have returned the questionnaire on this subject, as I have received only one-hundred and one.

Will each delegate present here today ask her president to see that the filled out questionnaires received be filled out and forwarded to the Convenor?

Now, to the questionnaires which I did receive, eleven were especially well filled in, and perhaps I should not particularize, but when I can tell a person nice things, I always like to do so. They are: New Glasgow, Springfield, Le 67, Riverside, Maple Leaf, Savage Harbour, St. Felix, Jubilee, Indian River, St. Columba, Sherbrooke and Stanhope. One sent a paper with no report, two had no name or address.

Only six had a discussion on Wills; nearly all had suggestions for improving the traffic laws; twenty-nine approved of Old Age Pensions as distributed at present; a number suggested measures that could be adopted for the better control of communicable diseases; eighty-four were in favor of teacher having to present a health certificate with their engagement papers; it has already become law that the age limit of teachers be 18 years.

More or less uncertainty exists in the minds of Institute members regarding women in politics. Canadian women for all these years in their patriotism have never been much given to showing it in political activity; but at the present time when economics are so closely linked in all its aspects. There is some pretty stiff economic thinking going on before we get out of the present muddle. Most of us in and it is up to the women to do their share of the thinking.

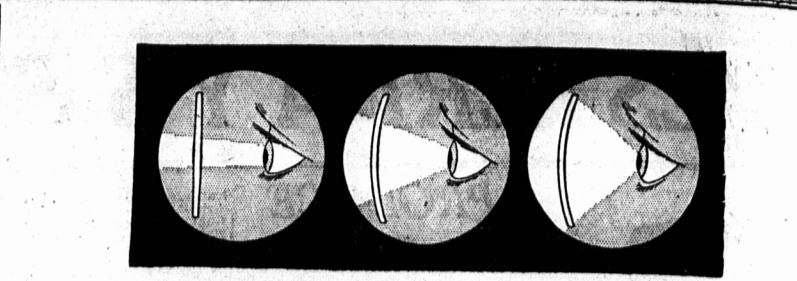
That woman's true and permanent place is the home, and that her duties as homemaker are so remote from political problems as to make her less than a man to acquire political knowledge or to take too active a part in politics will always be true of the wives, mothers and daughters whose time is devoted to domestic occupations, but hundreds of our daughters have gone for longer or shorter periods into professional, industrial, or commercial occupations. The conditions surrounding and affecting them are not always satisfactory.

For the majority, neither the remuneration, the hours of labor, nor the sanitation and safety are up to the required standards. Most of the measures necessary to remove these abuses will have to come through legislation. It should be our ideal that every Institute member consider this Province and our Dominion the home of our children and that we ask for the maintenance and opportunity for advancement. They can only come through law and order.

Our Convenor is fully aware of the responsibility of endeavouring to make a report of this nature, but so much that is of interest must be omitted, and time does not permit me going into further details, but it seems whatever it is, as legislation is being enacted today, it invariably comes back to the home.

Education. The following report on education and better schools was presented by Mrs. Fred MacLaren, convenor.
