Fine Program By Columbia Concert Trio

Charlottetown music lovers were treated last evening to a very fine performance by the Columbia Concert Trio, comprising Miss Ariana Bronn, violinist, Miss Archdall Walker, cellist, and Mr. Richard Gregor, pianist. The concert, given in the Prince of Wales College hall, was largely attended and was under the auspices of the Community Concert Association.

The brilliant young American artists presented a programme ranging from stately classic chamber music to special arrangements for their three instruments of American folk tunes. In addition to playing ensemble, each in the course of the programme was heard in individual numbers.

They opened with "Passacaglia" a short and not too familiar work by Handel. The piece differs markedly from J.S. Bach's tremendous composition of the same name, but is admirably adapted to the three instruments and is characteristic of the same great age which produced both masters.

Other trios included a full-length composition by Anton Arensky, "Pianoforte Trio in D Minor, Op. 32," and an interesting arrangement of American folk tunes by a Canadian composer, Dorothy Cadzow, of Edmonton. The latter work, entitled "On Tour," comprises adaptations of the following airs: "Sourwood Mountain" (Kentucky); "Mr. Frog Went a-Courtin'" (Virginia-Kentucky); "All the Pretty Little Horses" (Creole); "Casey Jones" (Railroad Ballad); "The Old Ch'soon Trail" (Wyoming-Cowboy); "Sweet Betsy from Pike" (Overlander Song) and "Turkey in the Straw" (Cowboy).

Mr. Gregor revealed his stature as a solo pianist in a brilliant performance which included two Preludes, Op. 28, and the powerful Scherzo in E Minor, Op. 29, by Chopin. He also gave very fine support to the other artists.

Miss Bronn was heard to particular advantage in the 2nd and 3rd movements of Mendelssohn's ever-popular Concerto for Violin in E Minor, and in a charming 18th century "Allegro" by Joseph Hector Flocco.

The Andante melody of the Mendelssohn number was played with great beauty by Miss Bronn, who has a truly magic touch in her higher notes and whose whole performance last night was outstanding.

The cello solos by Miss Walker were also beautifully rendered. They included "Elegie," by Gabriel Faure, a contemporary of Debussy and Ravel; "Malaguena," by Isaac Albeniz, master of Spanish folk music; and "Hungarian Rhapsody" by David Popper.

Each of the artists responded to entreaties at the close of the performance, and were warmly applauded by the audience.

T. B. Seal Sale Campaign Progress

The Tuberculosis Seal Sale Campaign of the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League reached a total of \$9,134.94, up until January 31st. It was announced yesterday by Mr. Earl Taylor, president of the League. Last year the sum raised was \$9,127.36.

Mr. Taylor pointed out that while \$20,000 was the Provincial objective to provide free X-rays for all, the sum raised was very gratifying and as much work as possible would be carried on in arresting the tuberculosis menace.

Personal solicitations by the Charlottetown Gyros, in connection with the campaign, amounted to \$2,436.95. This compared to \$2,178.75 raised in 1946-47.

The Summerside Y's Men's Club almost doubled the amount by subscribed last year when they collected \$971.85 compared to \$515.50.

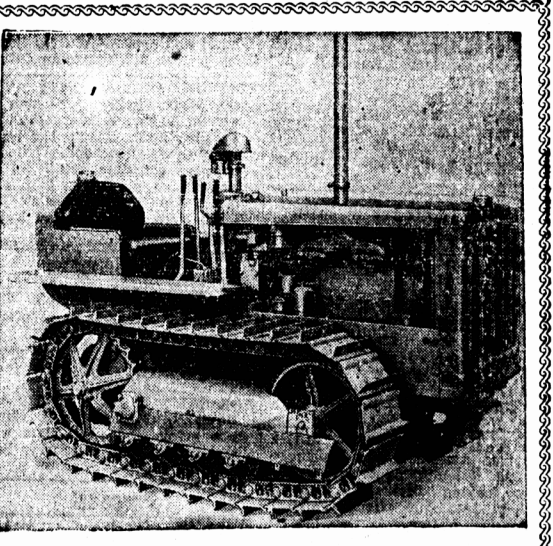
To Speak On Children's Fund
