FIRE ENGINE TRIED YESTERDAY.—Under the direction of Mr. R. B. Rattary, chairman of the Fire Committee of the City Council, the Silsby fire engine was tried out on the Steam Navigation wharf yesterday afternoon. The Silsby been improved with an injector for water feed, five new tubes have been inserted as well as a complete new set of water tubes and it is equipped now with couplings that will fit any hydrant or water main in the city. In the test yesterday it threw a heavy stream from the Steam Navigation wharf to the Marine wharf. Another test will be made today when the length of its throw will be measured.

FIRE PROTECTION

Board of Trade and City Council Meet in Conference and Discuss Improved Fire Protective Service.

A special meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held in their rooms last night to discuss the question of improved fire protection for the City. Mr. Hilson, president, presided, the numerous other meetings being held the same evening militating against a large attendance. A general discussion took place, and the consensus of opinion was that a permanent fire chief should be employed to look after the fire apparatus and to inspect all buildings, flues, electric fittings etc. Most of those who spoke favored a special fire tax of a quarter or an eighth per cent to defray the cost of an efficient fire department. It was also recommended that the business men should cooperate in appointing night watchmen for the different blocks as experience had proved that such watchmen detected fires in the early stage and so prevented serious conflagrations. The Acting Mayor, Mr. R. H. Jenkins and the City Council who had been meeting elsewhere came over and joined the board and were welcomed by the President. The Acting Mayor said they had come to ascertain the views of the members on the question of improved fire protection. The Fire Brigade Committee had made certain recommendations but it had been resolved to postpone taking action until the views of the public had been learned, and they would like to have any suggestions the Board of Trade had to make. The President informed the Acting Mayor the lines on which discussion had taken place and said the Board was prepared to back up the Council in any action they took to improve the fire protection. Councillor Dudley Wright said the Fire Brigade Committee had made certain recommendations chief of which was the appointment of the Fire Chief as a permanent official, and prohibiting the erection of any building in or near the business centre without having a slate, corrugated iron, or fireproof roof. Councillor Rattary stated that the Fire engine Silsby had been thoroughly overhauled and tested and was now proved capable of sending a stream to cover the highest building in the City. There was now more hose, some 4,300 feet, available than ever before, and more were on order. The Committee was prepared and anxious to do all they could to provide the greatest protection possible within their means. Several other members spoke and supported the recommendation and recommended that the water sprinkler should be available as a stand by in case of emergencies. Councillor Smith stated that it was essential they should have a man to devote all his time as fire chief. There was so much gasoline used now that it was necessary an inspector should be on the rounds to see that it was not stored in contravention of the law. Mr. MacGregor reported on the water pressure and said that they could provide a pressure that would endanger the hot water services if used to its full capacity. As the result of the conference it was resolved that the Board of Trade would support any action which the Council was prepared to take to improve the fire protection system along the lines suggested by the Fire Brigade Committee.

SPECIAL MEETING CITY COUNCIL

A Special Meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber last evening. Acting Mayor Jenkins occupied the chair and the following members of the Council were present: Wright, Miller, Rattary, Smith and McNevin. The report of the Fire Committee appointed at a previous meeting was received and on motion was laid on the table to be dealt with later at a full meeting of the Board. In view of the fact that a meeting regarding fire protection was being held under the auspices of the Board of Trade it was felt by a majority of the members of the Council that it would be well to defer action and hear the views of the citizens regarding this most important question.
