Champion Pressed Hard In Defence Of Golf Title

Harry Cooper Leads Field In First Round Of Canadian Open Golf Championship

ROYAL YORK GOLF CLUB, Toronto, Aug. 17.—Producing the fighting qualities of a real champion, "Lighthorse" Harry Cooper, of Chicago, began defence of his Canadian Open Golf Championship here today by leading the field of 138 stars to the wire in the first round of the title chase. Cooper breezed over the wind-swept and tricky Royal York layout in 70 strokes, two under par, to lead three straggling contenders by a single stroke.

Also in the same company came such noted sharpshooters as George Von Elm, the businessman of Detroit, and Willie Goggin, the young giant from Salada Beach, California, who reached the finals of the U. S. P. G. A. at Milwaukee last week. Canada also had her representatives among the flashy group, with Jack Armitage, Dundas, Ont., and R. H. Green, of Kingston sharing the spotlight.

Calumet Crusader Equals World's Trotting Record

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 17.—(A.P.)—Calumet Crusader, owned by E. Roland Harriman, President of the Grand Circuit and driven by the local reinsman, Will Dickerson, today equaled the world's three-year-old trotting record in winning the first division of the Progressive Trotting Stake, worth \$2,500, and feature of the programme at Good Time Park.

This was accomplished in spite of a heavy shower which flooded the lower part of the track before the final heat was raced leaving the upper turn dry and dusty. The time of the winner was 2:01 3-4, 2:02 1-4 and 2:02 1-4, equalling the record made by Tonia Britton at Lexington in 1931.

In the auction betting Calumet Crusader was a \$100 to \$80 favorite over the field. The third division of the Progressive Trot was won by the one to two favorite Calumet Bidwell, all out each time.

1933 Exhibition Promises To Be Best On Records

Exhibits, Vaudeville, Midway And Horse Races Expected To Surpass All Previous Island "Fairs".

When the Prince Edward Island Provincial Exhibition opens its gates on Monday evening next, August 21st, it will be the 43rd year of its existence. In that long period of time it has made steady progress and this year it is expected to stage the finest effort of its career.

THE HORSE RACING PROGRAM
This will be given on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with from three to four classes daily. There are 119 entries comprising 84 of the best and fastest horses in the Maritimes. The track is in apple pie order and there is sure to be a very low average of time made both trotting and pacing. Prizes are given for leading driver, for winning drivers, for grooms and for breaking track records and with these incentives and the good purses the racing will be fast and furious.

NEW FEATURE
A new feature this year will be the encouragement of classes for saddle horses and jumpers and fifteen of these are expected over from Halifax, the creme de la creme of the Halifax Riding Club's saddlers and jumpers. The Charlottetown Riding Club will also send some 21 entries. These will be established in a new set of barns which are under construction now and will be completed Saturday night.

THE BUILDINGS
All the barns and buildings have been gone over, repaired and renewed, thoroughly cleaned and disinfected under the watchful eye of the Department of Agriculture. At present thirty men are at work on various duties around the grounds, some painting, some white-washing, others building and renewing or repairing. Never in the history of the Association has its grounds looked so attractive and the fact that the Directors have seen fit to employ so many men is also giving rise to very favorable comment among the people. There is no want of courage about those handling the affairs of the Provincial Exhibition.

THE MIDWAY
Lynch's 1933 Midway has been secured to provide the entertainment on the main grounds for those who do not wish to take in the races and Vaudeville. New features, new rides and other mechanical devices have been added since last year and the whole equipment is up-to-date as a fun maker. At night it will be a gorgeous, glittering spectacle with its thousands of bright lights, giving the greatest fun for the kiddies and older ones too.

THE VAUDEVILLE
The Vaudeville program of 1933 is by far the most ambitious ever attempted. The famous Huxford Family, one of Wirth and Hamill's best acts, has been secured as highliner. They made a great name for themselves in Europe before coming to America and have been the premier attraction at Coney Island the past month. They will come direct from New York to Charlottetown and after filling their engagement here will make a tour of the greatest fairs in the U. S. A. They are a troupe of reckless daredevil performers, doing their stunts on a slender wire suspended at dizzy heights. In the circus world they are unquestionably considered the most daring and accomplished high wire walkers.
