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NOTHING CAN CHECK MINERS' WALK-OUT

Government Confiscating Coal in Transit. Hundreds of Coal Laden Cars Taken Over by Fuel Administration.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Information obtained from the bituminous coal fields of the United States, in which more than 400,000 members of the United Mine Workers of America have been ordered out on strike indicated that there would be nothing which would check the momentum of the walkout despite the temporary restraining order which was issued Friday in the United States District Court at Indianapolis. Deprived of the directing hands of its leaders, as a result of the injunction, the membership of the Union was prepared to enter the first full working day since the strike order became effective in an effort to demonstrate its ability to halt the production of soft coal throughout the nation.

PRINCE OF WALES CONCLUDING VISIT

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—After a tour of the Dominion extending over almost three months in which time he has been received with greatest and most sincere enthusiasm in every city and town which he has visited His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, today returns to Toronto. The visit will be a short one and almost entirely unofficial. He will arrive at 9.30 o'clock this morning and will leave for Ottawa at 10.30 Wednesday morning. From Ottawa, he goes to say good bye to the Governor General. He leaves for Washington to return the visit made to King George by President Wilson last winter. As far as known he will then leave for England from New York.

3,000 CANADIANS STILL IN ENGLAND

Two Thirds of These are Expected to Leave this Month. Less Than 100 Military Sick Cases.

Fourteen Hallowe'en Joy Makers Die in Collision

WOODBURY, N. J., Nov. 3.—Fourteen persons were killed and thirteen injured, some of them seriously in the grade crossing accident at Clark's bridge, eight miles from here, late last night, when a Pennsylvania railroad train struck an automobile truck loaded with masqueraders. Twelve of the victims were killed instantly and two others died at the Cooper hospital, Camden. Two of them were women. Ten of the injured are still in the hospital and it is feared some of them cannot recover. There were thirty-two persons in the truck.

German Troops Evacuate Schleswig

LONDON, Nov. 3.—German troops have evacuated Elenburg, the chief port of Schleswig, according to a Copenhagen despatch. Premier Bauer will go to Schleswig tomorrow to direct German propaganda preparatory to the Schleswig plebiscite according to the Koelnische Zeitung.

Germans Dismantling Rhine Fortress

GENEVA, Nov. 3.—The Germans have started dismantling the fortress at Istein, on the Rhine about eight miles north of Basel. The work is being conducted under the supervision of Allied officers. The fortress was equipped with long range guns commanding both the German and Swiss shores of the Rhine for a long distance.

SOLDIERS' GRAVES WERE DECORATED

PARIS, Nov. 3.—Wreaths were placed on the graves of the soldiers of the Allied and Associated countries by representatives of the government and patriotic associations today. The Canadian colony of Paris met at the Grenades Cemetery in Versailles and placed flowers on Canadian and Allied graves and at the cemeteries at Suresnes, St. Cloud and Loinville. The graves of Canadians and Americans were also decorated.

Belgians Decorated Graves.
BRUSSELS, Nov. 3.—For the first time since the war, the Belgians, Saturday, were allowed to commemorate the death of their heroes. All Saints Day was celebrated with great pomp in Brussels. Burgomaster Max deposited flowers on the graves of Belgians, Canadians, English, French and Americans. Wreaths were also deposited on the grave of Vancampenhout the composer of a La Brabanconne, the Belgian National Anthem.

U.S. COAL STRIKE BOON TO BRITISH

NEWCASTLE, England, Nov. 3.—The coal strike in America has caused a tremendous boom in the coal industry in England and Wales, which employs a million persons in some 3,500 mines. While the fight of their brothers workers overseas for wage increase and shorter hours creates some measure of sympathy among British miners the fact remains uppermost in all minds that what is the gain there is the loss here. There is the realization that the American strike benefits every British miner's home.

Drury to Take Charge On November 14th

C. Governor, will on that day take over the reins of Government with the assistance of such cabinet ministers as shall in the meantime have been selected to assist him.

GRAND TRUNK BILL IN SENATE TUESDAY

GERMANY MUST PAY FOR THE VIOLATIONS OF THE ARMISTICE

Must Surrender Cruisers and Destroyers for Those Sunk at Scapa Flow, also Other Material Equipment Equal to That Destroyed.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—Demand will be made of Germany that all violations of the armistice shall be made good. This has been called upon by the Supreme Council, which has completed the protocol to the German treaty. The protocol provides that Germany shall surrender cruisers and destroyers to replace those sunk at Scapa Flow and also surrender floating dry-docks, lighters, trains, tugs and other material equipment equal in value to that of the first class battleships destroyed which Germany cannot replace.

Terrible Famine In Petrograd

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 3.—A despatch to the Tidende from Helmingfors says the famine in Petrograd is assuming terrible proportions. 40,000 persons have died from starvation within a month, it is declared.
