SHOE PRICES LOWERED

BOSTON, March 21.—Reduction in the price of shoes has been announced by the manufacturers of this city and the Old Colony district generally, comprising one of the largest men's shoe-making centres in the United States. Although authoritative announcement of the amount of the cut is lacking, it is understood to be between 25 and 50 cents a pair, wholesale price. The price reduction follows the recent award of a wage cut of ten per cent made by the State Board of Conciliation and Arbitration. This wage cut, it was said, amounted to from 12 to 15 cents reduction in the factory costs of Brockton grade west shoes and from 11 to 15 cents a pair in the shoes in adjoining towns.

STEFANSSON IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, March 21.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, arrived in Ottawa today shortly before noon, and is staying at the Chateau Laurier. Mr. Stefansson expressed himself as well pleased with the reception he received here, and his expedition as demanded by Dr. R. M. Anderson, and three other members of the party who have made certain charges with regard to the conduct of Stefansson and the expedition generally.

Enlarge the Little Entente to Boost Industrial Affairs

BERLIN, March 21.—A new business, if not political, alliance will result from the conference of the three powers of the Little Entente and Poland which has just closed in Belgrade. Poland's special interests militate against her entering the little Entente, but the representatives of the four States, two of which, Poland and Czechoslovakia are principally industrial States with a future in the development of manufacturing facilities, while Roumania and Yugoslavia are almost exclusively agricultural, decided to pool their interests into an economic unit, with each State supplying its needs as far as possible from its neighbors. It is hoped thereby to build up a big interchange of manufactured goods and agricultural products.

The business alliance will be promoted by special arrangements for freight and passenger service between the four countries and mutual assistance in supplying fuel etc., for the railways.

The conference in addition secured a complete success in drafting a programme for common action at the Genoa conference. The four States will enter the conference pledged to the following program: Economic aid.

Second—Acceptance of the economic and financial association of the four Powers as an active factor in the reconstruction of Europe.

Third—Participation with the Western Powers in the work of reopening the Russian markets and maintaining an attitude of watchful waiting toward Russian political developments.

Fourth—A joint proposal on reformation in the exchange situation by the allocation of financial credits for the reconstruction and adjustment of customs barriers.

The four countries, according to advances in diplomatic circles, believe their association will be strong enough to enable them to speak at Genoa with the authority of a big Power.

Montreal Weekly Market Wire

The receipts of live stock at the two markets for the week ending March 16th, amounted to 938 cattle, 2300 calves 166 sheep and lambs and 2422 hogs. In addition to the above there were 713 cattle on through billing for export.

With a light run of cattle again this week trading was slow and said to be around 25 cents lower. With the exception of three or four loads, the cattle lacked both quality and finish. The receipts of calves were slightly lighter than without much improvement in quality. Prices were strong to about 50 cents higher. Very few sheep and lambs were offered and prices ruled steady. The hog market was unsettled. Packers were trying to buy cheaper but local demand being sufficient to absorb the offerings, prices remained steady with a weak undertone.

The effect of the Lenten season is being felt in the cattle trade. Butchers report demand very poor, especially for the cheap cuts, and consequently cattle that are not suitable for the Kpsher trade moved slow at lower prices than last week. With the exception of three cattle which sold at \$8.00 and one small lot of nice 1050 pound steers which brought \$7.85, the ruling price for heavy butcher cattle weighing around 1000 pounds was \$7.25 to \$7.50, but the bulk of the steers and heifers lacked quality and finish and sold from \$5.50 to \$7.00.

Common classes of butcher cattle brought generally from \$5.50 to \$6.00 with a few light common canner heifers going as low as \$4.00. Good cows were in demand and sold up to \$6.00 with an extreme top of \$6.50 in one case but the good cows and bulls were scarce. The majority of the cows and bulls brought from \$3.00 to \$4.25 in the case of cows and \$4.00 to \$4.50 for bulls. Canners and cutters were steady at from \$2.00 to \$3.00.

There was a slight falling off in receipts of calves due perhaps to the sharp break last week. The quality showed but slight improvement over last week. Prices ruled strong to 50 cents higher. A few small lots sold for \$8.00 with the bulk of the best lots changing hands at around \$7.50. Light plain calves brought from \$6.00 to \$6.25.

THE HOG MARKET OPENED WITH BUYERS AND SELLERS FAR APART. Sellers were asking \$14.00 and buyers offering \$12.00. The supply was not more than the needs of the local demand, buyers were forced to bid up. The bulk of the week's offering of select hogs sold from \$13.25 to \$13.50 which was the closing price for the week. A few loads of corn fed hogs were offered on Monday. These met with a poor demand and some of the heaviest, fattest lots sold for \$12.50, while select bacon type hogs were selling as high as \$13.50 on the same market on the same day. At the close of the week there were a few hogs unsold, but local butchers claimed that their supplies on hand were not heavy and that there should be a fairly good market for hogs next week.
