OUR NEIGHBORS AND OUR CENSUS

The comments of American newspapers on the Canadian census show a very varied tone. Some take the view that our slow progress results from our clinging to the monarchical idea and holding aloof from union with the Republic. They affect to believe that our progress will continue to be slow until we shall see where our true interest lies and join our fortunes with the United States. There are other American journals which take a more friendly and sensible view of the case, and see that our growth is solid and substantial and must go on.

The Chicago Record points out that there are seven American states in which the growth of population has been slower than in Canada. These are Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Delaware, Virginia, Nebraska and Kansas. Collectively these seven states had in 1890 a population larger than that of Canada. Their people then numbered 5,685,275 and in 1900 had increased to only 6,025,409, the increase being 340,124. Canada in the same time had gained over half a million. Yet the states named above are not disposed to despair of their future. Canada has vastly greater natural resources than they, much of which is yet but in the initial stage of development.

It is hardly necessary to remind such of our neighbors as are of the more critical sort that our census, although somewhat disappointing, has not given rise to any desire for annexation. Any such sentiment as may have existed in the Dominion was never at a lower ebb than now. We are well content with our institutions. A majority of our people believe we have the very best form of government in the world. There is no other community of five millions in the world who enjoy a greater measure of liberty, and few who have so much of the comforts of life coupled with so much security for life and property. We have an exceedingly rich possession for our numbers, and our trade is greater per head of our people than is found in many of the most progressive nations.

We enjoy and have enjoyed for over eighty-five years continued and assured peace. The flag and navy of the Empire give us every guarantee of protection. The Canada of to-day is a prosperous and contented country which faces the future with hope and confidence and with no desire whatever for a change in its political status. Canada is all right, and her people feel quite assured of the fact.

EXPOSITION IN ST LOUIS.

The President of the United States has officially invited the nations of the earth to attend the Exposition at St. Louis in 1903, in celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase. They are asked to send representatives, to forward exhibits, and the enterprise is now officially presented to the attention of the world. Henceforth it will have the dignity of an international exposition. The great fair is to be opened May 1, 1903, and will remain open until December 1.

NATIONAL SCANDAL.

The over-representation of Ireland has long been a national scandal. The publication of the last census returns has driven it home with a logic that it is impossible to resist. Finally, the conduct of the National members has deprived them of the sympathy even of their political allies.—Globe.

THE REAL GAINSBOROUGH.

LONDON, August 27.—The Express prints a story to the effect that a lodging house keeper at Brantford named Dawson has what he says is the real Gainsborough painting of the Duchess of Devonshire, which was stolen years ago from the Agnews. Dawson's story is not convincing.
