Mr. Gardiner has resigned the pastorate of Baptist church here.—The new school house at Red Point has been completed by the contractors, Freeman Stewart and Alfred Fraser, and is built in accordance with modern educational and advanced ideas, and contracts most favorably with the dingy and contracted buildings which yet do duty as schoolhouses in too many of our rural districts.—The day of consolidated schools is certainly coming, and the sooner the better.

The deceased had been in failing health during the past three years but his demise came somewhat unexpectedly. The late Mr. Warren who was twice married leaves a wife and six children, a brother Archibald in North Rustico, to mourn their loss; all of whom The Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

YESTERDAY forenoon Peter Newsom of the firm of Saunders & Newsom returned from Boston where he has been on a holiday trip for the past three weeks. Mr. Newsom during his visit to the Hub was the guest of his brother James E. who conducts an immense produce business on Atlantic Avenue. Mr. Newsom also took in the Brocton Fair and paid a short visit to Portland Me. At the fair Mr. Newsom was greatly pleased with the fine display of horses especially the fancy drivers which attracted special attention. The Fair was very similar to our own exhibition but it was not for the purpose of benefiting the agricultural people, but to make money for the town itself. The attendance during the week was very large and each day from ten to twenty thousand persons went down from Boston alone. Speaking of the great fish and meat markets on Atlantic Avenue Mr. Newsom says that the amount of trade done especially in fish is immense, twelve or fourteen vessels arriving each day laden with fish which is immediately disposed of, on the streets of Boston. The Guardian was pleased to learn that James E. Newsom is doing well in Boston. Recently he has taken over the whole business formerly conducted by Holt & Newsom and now the firm name is Newsom & Co. Mr. Newsom beside the general produce business has made a number of shipments of apples to England which have met a good market in that country.

OBITUARY.—Much sympathy is felt with the family of John Stinson, Marshfield, in the affliction which has recently visited the home. Harry Albert, the eldest of their three sons, had been in poor health for some time, and during the present summer gradually declined till on Friday, October 2nd, he passed away peacefully and resigned, in the twilight of the evening. Harry was an affectionate, quiet, inoffensive boy and completed nearly sixteen years of an earthly sojourn. In his lingering illness he manifested meekness and patience, enduring without a murmur, the burial took place on Sabbath, the 4th, when a large concourse of people, expressive of esteem and sympathy to the family, accompanied the procession the remains to the Presbyterian Church where a service was held, conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. H. Spencer, who spoke on the grounds of comfort afforded in the great truths of Christianity, a Christian view of death, and in the testimony given by the departed. An impressive part was that of the Sabbath School, which, under the excellent leading of the Superintendent, Mr. L. Foster led the procession. Occupied the centre pews, reformed in a circle around the grave, and, as the casket descended so slowly on the lowering reel, sang of A Happy Land.

We are here reminded of the death of the grand mother, Mrs. Thomas Stinson, of Marshfield which occurred on the 13th of last January and was not noticed in the press at the time. Mrs. Stinson was Isabella, daughter of the late Archibald McGregor of the same place and had reached the ripe age of 83 years. The deceased was an estimable lady and, though gone before, yet live and speak in memory and in the sanctifying influence of an exemplary life. Words and deeds never die. Her last illness was distressing as her body writhed in nervous prostration yet this was mollified by an abounding rejoicing, faith and hope in which her soul eventually departed to God. She left to mourn, a husband and three sons—Archibald on the homestead, John in the same community, and Henry in Charlottetown.
