ENGLISH DIG UP ROMAN THEATRE

(Canadian Press) LONDON, March 22 - A theatre which was used by the Roman occupants of Britain about the year A. D. 150 is soon to be unearthed. Within 20 miles from London is the pleasant city of St. Albans, whose towering cathedral is built largely of the bricks which went to the making of the important Roman town of Verulamium.

Half a mile away, in the quiet valley of the River Ver, are the ruins of the Roman town, and still buried beneath the pastureland is the theatre where "popular successes" of Ancient Rome used to be played before as notable an audience as could be mustered from both the L. O. L. and A. F. and A. M. Lodges in the community.

Over 100 sleighs followed his remains to the Church of Scotland cemetery where his body was laid beside that of his father who predeceased him 9 years ago. He is survived by his aged mother, his wife, three sons and one daughter, all of Charlottetown: Frank, Fenton, Stanley, and Grace, also one brother, George, and three sisters, Mrs. Cairns Chappell, Mrs. Ernest Strickland, Mrs. Roland Campbell, to all of whom the sympathy of the community is extended.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful in life so was he surrounded in death. The pall bearers were special friends of the deceased and members of the Masonic Lodge, Douglas Bell, Harry Muttart, Nathan Bell, McCurdy Bell, Fred Bell, Leigh Lowther.

VITALIZES DRAMA IN LONG STRETCH OF ONE NIGHTERS (Canadian Press) NEW YORK, March 22 - Katherine Cornell, beloved of Broadway, has forsaken the great white way for Main Street. Convinced the theatre must be national to be vital, she is covering 10,000 miles of one-night stands between New York State and the Pacific coast.

Miss Cornell, whose repertoire includes Shakespeare, Shaw and Rudolph Boster, has packed them in all along the way. She calls her success a triumph for the legitimate stage and a proof that the neglected "road" is far from dead.

One of the few of Theophrastus' greats who spurned the bathhouse of celluloid, Miss Cornell is sleeping on Pullman cars, dressing with her trouper and displaying her histrionic talents on second-

rate stages but before packed halls of unsophisticated admirers. The Elizabeth of the Wimpole Street Barretts has undertaken this tour of the smaller cities of the States to appear in as many cities as possible. Confident Americans will respond to a good play well acted. Miss Cornell has been given overwhelming receptions, has found a generation growing up without ever having seen a play acted by living players, has found it keen to discover what the legitimate theatre has to offer.

After turning her back on a season in New York and the eastern States to visit the one-night stands, this talented actress has not complained of the strain of train-riding days and play-acting nights. She doesn't pose as a self-sacrificing missioner for the drama, but as an enthusiast who has proven "it can be done."
