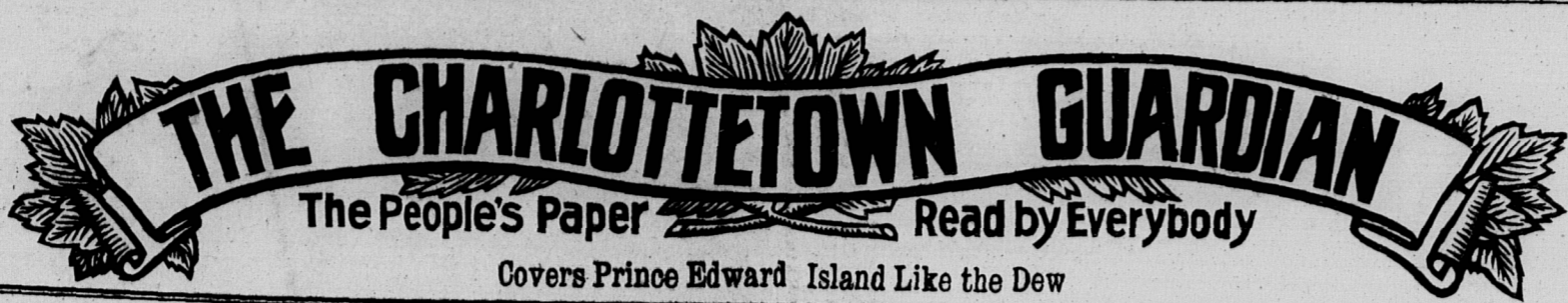

Borden Endorses Bennett's Fiscal Policy

Prospects Indicate A Veritable Landslide For The Conservatives

Survey Of The Different Provinces Shows a Strong Swing In Favor Of Hon. R. B. Bennett In The Voting To Take Place On The 28th Inst.

Not Cheering News For The Can. Farmer

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, July 24.—The following market report in the Montreal Gazette is not cheering news to the Canadian farmer. "Nearly six million pounds of New Zealand butter is nearing the shores of Canada on board the S. S. Huntington and S. S. Mahana. The Huntington has a cargo of 58,000 boxes and the Mahana 37,000 boxes. Each box represents 56 pounds."

JUNE IMPORTS OF NEW ZEALAND BUTTER

Total of 2,855,415 Pounds, Valued At \$771,859 Arrived In Canada Last Month.

OTTAWA, July 24.—Imports of butter into Canada during June totalled 2,855,415 pounds, valued at \$771,859. This was a decrease from May when 2,952,367 pounds, with a value of \$904,749 were imported according to a return issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Sir John's Famous Resolution

On March 12, 1928, Sir John MacDonald put on the records of the House his famous resolution in these words: "That this House is of the opinion that the welfare of Canada requires the adoption of a National Policy, which by a judicious readjustment of the Tariff, will benefit and foster the Agricultural, the Mining, the Manufacturing and other interests of the Dominion; that such a policy will retain in Canada thousands of our fellow countrymen now obliged to expatriate themselves in search of the employment denied them at home will restore prosperity to our struggling industries now so sadly depressed, will prevent Canada from being made a sacrifice market, will encourage and develop an active interprovincial trade and moving (as it ought to do) in the direction of a reciprocity of Tariffs with our neighbors, so far as the varied interests of Canada may demand with greatly tend to procure for this country, eventually, a reciprocity of Trade."

Great Campaign Closes Tonight

Former Premier Will Address Mass Meeting In Ottawa—Sentiment Against Govt. So Strong That Money Cannot Overcome It.

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., July 25.—The Conservative campaign closes tomorrow night with a great mass meeting here at which Sir Robert Borden will preside. Today he issued a statement to the press absolutely endorsing Hon. R. B. Bennett's fiscal policy, and he will further state in his speech that Mr. Bennett's fiscal policy is what he advocated twenty-five years ago and all during his public career.

Flyers Await Fair Weather

(Canadian Press) CROYDON AIRDROME, England, July 25.—Wolf Hirth and Oscar Weller, the German aviators who started from Berlin yesterday in a small monoplane on an attempted flight to the United States by way of the Orkneys, arrived here this noon from Calais. Hirth, who acted as spokesman for the pair, said he and Weller would fly to Hanworth Airdrome in the vicinity of London late today and there await favorable weather reports before starting on the actual Atlantic flight.

On Final Test For Big Test

(Special to the Guardian) CARDINGTON, Eng., July 25.—The giant British airship R-100 left its mooring mast tonight and started on its final 24 hour test flight preparatory to starting on its Atlantic flight for Montreal.

Segrave Left Estate, \$82,000

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, July 25.—The estate of the late Sir Henry Segrave, king of speed on land and water, who lost his life when his Miss England II upset in Lake Windermere last month amounted to \$82,000, it is announced today.

The Effect Of The King Government Tariff Policies

(Special to the Guardian) BRANTFORD, Ont., July 25.—Col Henry Cockshutt, discussing the effect of the King Government tariff policies, stated here tonight that 10,000 men were engaged in the United States manufacturing agricultural implements for Canada, while only 2,700 were employed by Canadian firms for the supply of the home market. He declared that the Government at Ottawa at the same time had an understanding from the Canadian manufacturers that given a protective tariff they would not increase prices, provided cost of raw materials were not increased. The King Government he said, went ahead and gave trade that belonged to Canada to others. They did not ascertain what conditions those others were given in return.

Authenticity Of Bottle Note Is Now Discredited

HALIFAX, N. S., July 25.—The authenticity of a note found in a bottle in Halifax harbor yesterday, saying that "Harry Anderson and 'Harvey Nastle' were marooned on an island unknown to them, was discredited today when word was received from Souris, P.E.I., that no persons named Anderson or Nastle, nor any "Box 781" were known there. The note, dated March 10, 1930, requested that relatives of Anderson and Nastle at Box 781, Souris be notified.

"The number of dairy cattle exported to the United States does not indicate that dairying was injured as the extremely high prices offered by American buyers induced Canadian dairymen to reduce their herds and with this 'cutting out' and improved breeding and feeding, fewer cows are producing increased quantities of milk."—Patriot editorial entitled "The Truth About Butter," July 24, 1930.

THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE

"The demand for milk cows is still very great and more buyers are coming to our shores every year from the United States and Upper Canadian points. The demand has no doubt stimulated the breeding of improved cattle, and more calves from imported bulls are being raised by our farmers. UNFORTUNATELY, HOWEVER, WHILE THE TOTAL CATTLE POPULATION HAS INCREASED THERE ARE REASONS TO BELIEVE THAT THE NUMBER OF MATURE COWS HAS UNDERGONE A DECLINE. Buyers are concerned chiefly with the purchase of the HIGHEST TYPE GRADES, that are due to freshen shortly after their arrival at destination. The removal from the Province of these animals which are just ready to go into their period of production HAS A DEMORALIZING EFFECT NOT ONLY UPON THE INDIVIDUAL HERD PRODUCTION, but to some extent ON THE VOLUME OF MILK BEING SUPPLIED OUR BUTTER AND CHEESE FACTORIES. The sale of calves is still an unfortunate procedure on the part of our farmers. The disposing of low grade calves of scrub heritage to be commended, but the wholesale disposal of heifers from improved herds is to be greatly deplored. We do not feel the effect of these sales until long after they are made, BUT WE CERTAINLY WILL COME TO A PERIOD OF LOW DAIRY PRODUCTION IN THE PROVINCE IF THE DEMAND FOR THE MATURE COW CONTINUED and the operations of buyers who are securing car lots of good calves at very low prices are to be tolerated."—Report of Minister of Agriculture for fiscal year ending Dec. 31, '29.
