Former Great in Vaudeville Dies

LOS ANGELES Jan. 12 (AP)—Canadian-born Eva Tanguay, who earned \$2,000,000 as one of the big names of North American vaudeville only to spend her declining years in poverty, died Saturday of a cerebral haemorrhage. She was 66.

One of Florenz Ziegfeld's discoveries, Miss Tanguay was a sensation in 1910 in "The Charaponee" and became known as the "I don't care girl" for the song of the same name that she made famous.

Miss Tanguay was born in MacLellan, Que., but moved to Massachusetts at an early age.

At the peak of her success she earned \$3,500 weekly, but the stock market crash and the decline of vaudeville reduced her to poverty after she was forced to sell her \$45,000 home and its \$50,000 worth of furnishings at nearby Toluca Lake.

Falling sick, dogged hard for fifteen years ago one red bulb burned in the midst of the white footlights so she could locate the centre of the stage.

But the burning Tanguay spirit moved on in spite of the congestive heart failure, dropsy and arthritis that plagued her later years.

"I prefer to be remembered as I was," she once said.

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching last evening on the text: "Be sure your sin will find you out" (Numbers 32:23), the Minister, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers, said: What we have said is searching enough and solemn enough to make any man think seriously of any kind of sin. The strong probability of its detection and exposure, the certainty of its disastrous effects upon character in this life, the inevitability of the stings and pains which it would inflict through conscience, and the absolute sureness of its exposure and punishment in the life to come, — all this is of a nature calculated to make us pray with a new and deep earnestness when we recite the Lord's Prayer, "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." My soul, be on thy guard!

But I would not be giving the whole message of Christ, or the Gospel, or the Scriptures, did I conclude the sermon at this point. Did I stop here, I might warn many, but others I might leave plunged in melancholy and unhappy reminiscence. But, thank God, it is not necessary to stop here. Where sin has abounded, grace has much more abounded. If sin is the strongest, the darkest, the most terrible fact in life, it is matched by another fact, a fact mightier and stronger; and that is the fact of God's redeeming love, that the blood of Jesus Christ cleanse us from all sin. God has not dealt lightly with sin; but He sent the great Champion, His only Son, to meet it and to conquer it in the fearful battle of Calvary. Henceforth to them that repent and confess their sins and put their faith in Christ, there is no more condemnation for sin. As far as east is distant from the west, so far hath He put our sins from us. "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as wool; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as white as snow."

HINTS ON WAY TO WALK WELL

Walk and stand with toes pointing straight ahead so that the big toe seems to have a grip on the ground. Carry weight forward from heel to toe, pressing on toes. Posture is of distinct importance in walking. Keep toes pointing straight ahead, abdominal muscles flat and firm, chest wide with good expansion, head well balanced, and chin in. Swing arms vigorously from the shoulders.

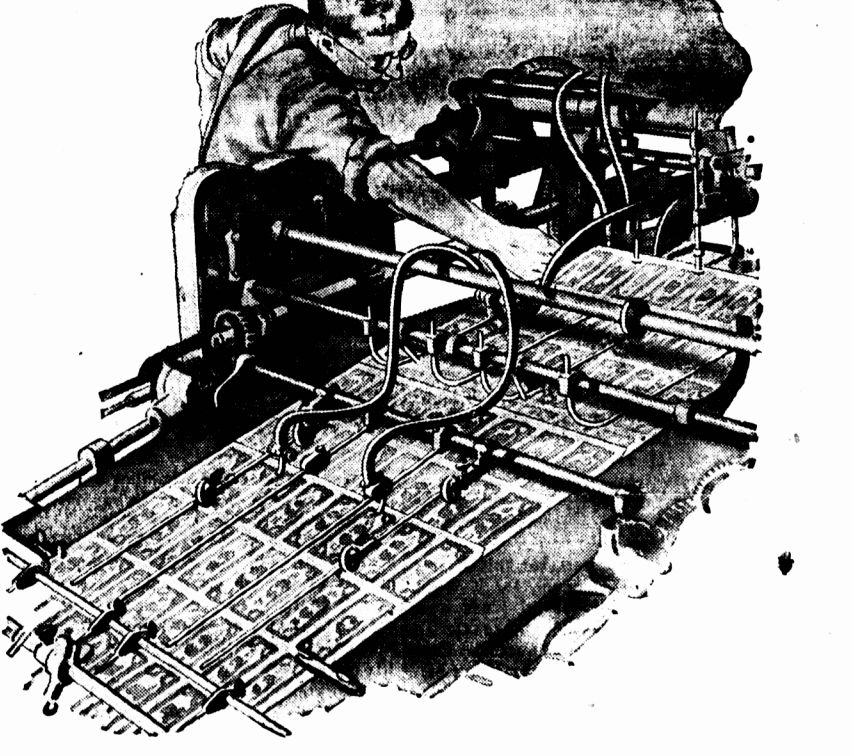
