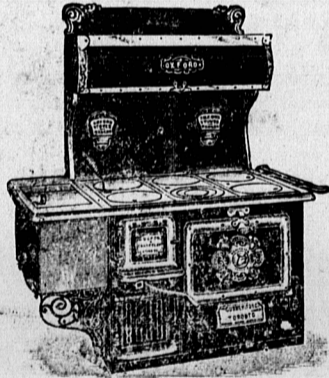

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At the first quarter turn, was taken by Jack McKerron. In the second heat the race was virtually divided. Margin hooked with Penisa Maid and they teamed it to the half in 1.02. Third quarter was stepped in 30 1/2 seconds. When the turn home was made a head wind made the struggle harder and the pair slowed down. Jack McKerron, four lengths back at the three quarters, came with a rare burst of speed, but broke just as he passed the two mares. He ran over the finish line and was set back to third place. Penisa Maid was two lengths ahead of Margin.

Margin opened as favorite at \$100 to \$25 was kept as first choice after her loss of the opening heat, when Jack McKerron and Penisa Maid each had a heat the field sold at \$100 to \$48 for Margin, for whom there was not a chance to win. Best time 2.06 1/2. Three easy heats were trotted by the Harvester (barred in

the pooling) to win the flatbush race. Gentle H., favorite for second honors, scored then by beating Beatrice Bellini in the third heat. Ella Amulator winner of the 2.09 pace in straight heats was a strong favorite, and was the third victorious member of the T. W. Murphy stables in two days.
