Wings Shutout Toronto 3-0 To Split Games; Leafs Won Saturday 6-2

DETROIT, Feb. 23.—(CP)—Goalie Johnny Mowers, Detroit Red Wings rookie got back into contention for hockey's Vezina Trophy by shutting out the league-leading Toronto Maple Leafs, 3-0, in a National League game tonight before 11,338 spectators. Mowers, who yielded six goals to Toronto Saturday night, now has 80 goals chalked against him with nine games to go, while Walter (Turk) Broda of the Leafs has 78 with eight games remaining. It was Mowers' third shut-out of the season. Detroit scored a goal in each period, with young Sid Abel getting the first, after nine minutes six seconds of play on passes from Eddie Wares and Bob Whitlaw. Sid H. we talked in the second period when he blasted home his own rebound and Carl Liscombe got the final goal at 8:21 of the third period. Toronto meanwhile was helpless as Mowers masterfully kicked out repeated scoring attempts. It was the first shut-out against the Leafs since last November 21 when Chicago won, 1-0.

I would like to have space in your paper to explain to the hockey public the item which appeared in the Guardian of February 21st in regard to Juvenile hockey playoffs which were to be played at Holy Redeemer Rink, February 20th, and did not take place. This item claims that the Canadian Juvenile hockey team was not registered and also that the game should not be played in an open air rink of which I am going to explain right now to be fact and not a lot of gossip. In regard to registration of the Canadian team I wish to explain the following: On February 4th in conversation with a prominent hockey official he told me that it cost ten dollars to register a Juvenile club and three dollars for the team and they had to be registered by Feb. 5th, 1941. I am very sorry to say that this Club did not have the funds to register so therefore, taking his word for it, we were forced to drop the registering of this team, which was the same as I would not have heard that you do not have to pay thirteen dollars to register a team. I do not possess for this the reason why this team was late in registering, due to listening to advice stated above, and that we would be willing, I admit, to attend the playoffs, with the Juvenile Royals; the winners of this sudden death game to go on and meet the other title holders of the juvenile league. We played this game at once so we would not interfere in any way with the schedule they had already drawn up. We also explained to Mr. McCourt and myself, encouraging mid-get and juvenile hockey to the best of our ability and time in the past three years and that many prospects from teams we have had had been picked for both Juvenile and Junior ranks. Some consideration should be given to the men who have gone this far for the love of sport, not to the men who wait until the young fellows are started along the game then come along and pick them for their teams without putting any hand with the young lads beforehand. We received a reply from Mr. Hanson Dowell stating as follows: "An agreeable arrangement was not in touch and the coaches of both teams agreed that they would play two games, one to be played on February 20 and the second February 21st. This was agreed upon by coaches of both teams. But when our team appeared at the Holy Redeemer Rink on the night of Feb. 20th, they were surprised to find that the Royals only were going to count this game as an exhibition game. What I would like to know is this, who is running the playoffs, the Juvenile Royals or the President of the M. A.H.A. Or do the Royals without playing right given to them without playing any team to compete in the playoffs with Summerside.
